## 'One Family's Story - The Rench Family in Stoneleigh'

Sheila then gave a fascinating talk about Sheila Rench's family. Sheila was born in 1931, her father was a carpenter for the Stoneleigh Estate and the family lived in 'School Cottages' (now Church Meadow Cottage'). Sheila knew that her family connection with Stoneleigh had gone back two generations but until Sheila began her research she had no idea it could be traced back to fullers in 1545, all through the female line. Tracing church records, Sheila had found records of each generation, with more details in the notebooks of James Wentworth Leigh, and this information was presented with illustrations of the monarchs of the time.

It was regretted that Sheila Rench was too unwell to attend the meeting but SHS recorded its thanks and good wishes to her.
