PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Meetings

The April Ordinary Council Meeting will be held at Stoneleigh Village Hall on Thursday 8th April 2010 at 7.30 p.m.

One of the agenda items will be the new proposed High Speed Two Rail Link.

This is a meeting for Councillors which the public has a right to attend.

Stoneleigh's Annual Parish Meeting will be held in Stoneleigh Village Hall on Thursday 29th April 2010 at 7.30 p.m.

This is a statutory meeting at which members of the Parish Council are required to report back to the electorate on their work over the past twelve months.

Precept/Council Tax

The amount precepted by the Parish Council from the District Council for the financial year 2010/2011 is £12,952 which is an increase of £296 (2.3%).

Warwickshire County Council - Temporary Road Closures

B4115 Ashow Road

The above road will be closed to through traffic from the junction with A452 Leamington Road for a distance of approximately 100m in a north easterly direction from the 10th to 20th April 2010, for gas mains replacement work.

An alternative route will be available via A452 Leamington Road, B4113 Stoneleigh Road, B4113 Coventry Road and B4115 Ashow Road.

Access to and egress from properties and land adjacent to this length of road, and for pedestrians, will be maintained at all times.

Kings Hill Lane, Stoneleigh

The above road will be closed to through traffic from the junction with Green Lane for a distance of approximately 400m in a south westerly direction from 25th to 27th May 2010 for pole and aerial cable replacement works for BT Openreach.

An alternative route will be available via B4113 St Martins Road,

B4115 Ashow Road, C32 Birmingham Road, C32 Stoneleigh Road.

Access to and egress from properties and land adjacent to this length of road, and for pedestrians, will be maintained at all times.

Stoneleigh Showground

Some members of the public are still walking in the Showground on land that has no public access. Very shortly there will be cattle in the Chartery Paddock (the field each side of the pack-horse bridge) with electric fences round.

Can we remind people that this land has no public access.

Warwickshire Police

There will be a mobile police station at Stoneleigh Village Hall on Saturday 17th April 2010 16:00hrs – 16:30hrs.

Warwickshire Community and Voluntary Action (WCAVA) and Warwick District Council

Following serious flooding in various parts of the district over the past few years WCAVA - Warwick District has been working with Warwick District Council to distribute grants of up to £200 for local residents, to help secure their homes against possible future flooding. The scheme is offered on a first come first served basis until the fund is used up. The maximum grant allocated is £200 per household.

Any homeowner in Warwick District is eligible to apply for the grant, regardless of whether or not your home has been affected by the floods. However, the grant can only be used to purchase flood defence items to prevent flooding.

Warwickshire County Council – NEW Home Wood Chipping Service Warwickshire County Council is offering a subsidised service which is available to Warwickshire householders Monday to Friday by appointment. The chippings will be left with the householder in plastic bags supplied as part of the service. Chippings are left for use by the householder and will NOT be taken off site. Garden woody waste must be no greater than 13cm (5") in diameter and of manageable length.

Material that is unsuitable to chip will be left for the householder to deal with; e.g. processed or treated wood pallets or fence posts.

The resident MUST be at home while the work is being done. Garden waste for chipping must be in an area with vehicular access. The cost of each visit (Max 1 hour) is £20 inc VAT.

A second extract from the reminiscences of Mr Harry Edmunds

The next thing I remember was the Coronation of King Edward the Seventh. There were two marquees and merry go rounds, coconut shies and races for the children and a mug for every child. One marquee was for food and the other for drinking and a big band.

In 1905 Lord Leigh passed on and all the school children lined up on either side of the footpath from the church gates to Motslow Bridge. Before he died he used to entertain all the tenants to a dinner and sports every September. They used to come in the old Warwickshire wagons from Westwood Heath, Leek Wootton, Hill Wootton and Stoneleigh and all the food used to be cooked in the Stoneleigh Abbey kitchens. It was what people used to call a Wake. At that time Lord Leigh used to drive his own brougham to church on Sunday, it was then that the public house was made outdoors.

In 1908 and 1909 we had two big barn fires at Kingswood Cottages, it was all hands to the pump. The Reverend Noble Page went to London for an operation for appendicitis. It was a sad end when he passed on.

It was in the same year the first bus made at the Daimler was brought to test it up Stoneleigh Hill and when it got half way up it stopped and when it started coming back down the hill it ran up the bank, tipped over and burst into flames. That happened at four o' clock in the afternoon. I stood and watched it myself at the bottom of the hill.

It was in the same year the Reverend Cooke got married and brought his bride home, and the school children lined both sides of the road by the school.

STONELEIGH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Only one, rather unusual crime, reported this month. During the night of Friday 12th March someone completely covered a car in Birmingham Road with plaster powder. Overnight some became wet and set hard. The owner is completely unaware of upsetting anyone to warrant this action. Obviously, the police would like help with any information about this.

On the good side, the police in Warwick District have recorded a 38.5% reduction in serious violent crime i.e. 265 less victims over an 11 month period. Similarly there have been 807 fewer anti-social behaviour incidents in 2009 compared with the previous year. Sadly Stoneleigh area was the only one in the district with an increase: from 65 to 85 incidents (+26.2%). Possibly the plaster incident falls into this category. There has, however, been an increase in the number of vehicle thefts and thefts from vehicles in Warwick District often with thieves walking into properties through unlocked doors and picking up the keys. Don't leave them visible.

Finally the police have issued a list of things everyone should do to protect their property

- 1. Don't hide spare door keys. Leave them with someone you trust, because thieves always know where to look.
- 2. Fit good locks to doors and windows. Use them!
- 3. Change locks when you move house.
- 4. Use lights and radios on time switches to make your home appear to be occupied.
- 5. Keep windows and doors secure when you are elsewhere in your home or garden.
- 6. Fit a good quality alarm from a reputable supplier.
- 7. Fit and use a door chain.
- 8. Participate in Neighbour Watch to help protect each other.

Information concerning children in Stoneleigh Village Club





THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

Omelette Arnold Bennett Serves 2



Ingredients

300ml / ½ pint milk

 $300\text{ml} / \frac{1}{2}$ pint water

3 bay leaves

2 slices onion

6 black peppercorns

280g / 10oz undyed smoked haddock fillet

6 eggs

20g / 3/4oz butter

2-3 tablespoons double cream

2 tablespoons freshly grated parmesan

Mix the milk and water in a large shallow pan and heat to simmer. Add the bay leaves, onion and peppercorns.

Add the smoked haddock and poach for about 5 minutes until cooked.

Lift the fish out on to a plate and leave until cool enough to handle.

Flake the fish discarding skin and bones

Pre-heat the grill ready for the last stage of cooking.

Heat a 23-25cm nonstick frying pan over medium heat.

Beat the eggs.

Swirl the butter around the frying pan and pour in the eggs.

When the omelette is set underneath but still moist on top sprinkle on the cooked haddock.

Pour the cream on top then sprinkle with the parmesan.

Put the omelette, still in the frying pan, under the hot grill until risen and lightly golden.

Serve on a warmed plate with a crisp green salad and some crusty bread or croutons.

FROM THE VICARAGE

By the time this magazine arrives, we will be on the verge of Holy Week and Easter – and will also have enjoyed (I hope) our Church Annual Meetings where Churchwardens and PCC members will have been elected. It took another week before the message sunk from my brain to my heart, but I got there in the end: and I have thanked God ever since that he didn't give up on me during those preceding more wayward years.

I hope that you will join in the re-enactment of that drama through our many and varied times of worship and contemplation. As well as our regular Sunday service times, we will gather on Thursday morning and evening, Friday morning and afternoon, and Saturday evening. Each service will be different in style and mood, but together they help us to build up and be part of the 'big picture' of Christ's great act of salvation which is offered to all people. It is a life-changing, and death-changing experience – and certainly worth a bit of diary-changing to get involved with

3-PARISH SPOTLIGHT

During March, we have been enjoying Lent Breakfasts each Saturday morning in Stoneleigh Church. Those members who have provided all the food and drink each week have done a fantastic job in less-than-easy circumstances and we have all indulged in a very un-Lenten fashion! However, we have then had some good studies looking at themes brought out by the film "Ice Age", considering isolation, healing of memories, the challenges of change and issues of prejudice and what we pass on to future generations.

Now we approach Holy Week and Easter – the very heart of the Christian Faith – and will be sharing many activities across the three parishes. There will be a morning service of Holy Communion for Maundy Thursday at Leek Wootton 10.30am, and our Agape at 7pm at Stoneleigh Village Hall, where we remember the 'Last Supper' by sharing Holy Communion in the context of a meal. If you wish to come to this, you will need to pre-book for catering reasons.

On Good Friday, we begin with a short "All Age" service at Leek Wootton 9am after which you can join in walking to St John's, Kenilworth. After a refreshment stop there, the Churches Together in Kenilworth & District Procession of Witness begins as we walk first to Talisman Square for an Open Air service and then continue to Abbey Fields where the large Cross is set up. After that, it is a sprint to Stoneleigh for the 3-hour devotional service beginning at 12 noon. For all these events, you are invited to join in for as much or as little as you choose – with the service at Stoneleigh designed to arrive/leave on the hour or half-hour.

On Saturday, Easter Eve, Stoneleigh Church will be open in the afternoon to enjoy the wonderful decoration of the Church, and some good refreshments, before we begin our series of "Services of Light" at the three churches when we light our Easter Candles to symbolise the resurrection light of Christ beginning to reappear through the darkness. These services will be at 5pm in Stoneleigh, 6.30pm in Ashow and 8pm in Leek Wootton.

For some of us, Easter morning will begin very early at Coventry Cathedral where there is a Confirmation service taking place at 5.30am when at least one of our members will be affirming her faith and

receiving the laying-on-of-hands by the Bishop. Then it is back to the Parishes for our regular Easter celebrations in all three churches.
