From the Vicarage:

November is a month where my thoughts go back very much to France. It was in November 1994 when I began my six year ministry among the English-speaking community in Lyon and I was immediately immersed into events related to Remembrance Day. My very first task, before I'd even led a service at the church, was to take part in the annual ceremony in a small town to the north of Lyon called St.Germain-au-Mont-d'Or.

Towards the end of the First World War, a transit camp for British soldiers was set up in a field on the edge of the town - now known as the *Pré des Anglais (Meadow of the English)*. Here, thousands of soldiers passed through, many receiving medical care for their wounds, with around one hundred dying there. They are buried, together with some British airmen from the Second World War, in the Commonwealth War Cemetery which is next to the town's own cemetery where their own war memorial stands.

Each year, members of the British community in the Lyon area (including the Consul, and members of the Royal Air Force Association and the Royal British Legion) join with the townsfolk and representatives of the French military together with ex-servicemen and Resistance members for a bilingual ceremony remembering those, both British and French, who gave their lives in the guest for peace and freedom. Central to the ceremony are the children of the town. They carry the wreaths, are the first to follow the military band in the procession from the town hall to the cemeteries, and accompany the mayor in actually laying the wreaths at the various memorials. Together with the local French priest, I would lead a time of Bible reading and prayer at each cemetery, and then we would march back to the town and have a time in a local hall where there would be music, speeches, food and drink.

In a town which suffered through the German occupation, there is little concept of glorifying war. This ceremony continues each year to ensure that the horrors of war are not forgotten, and the active involvement of the children ensures that the sacrifice of the past generations will not be forgotten either.

Warfare continues to bring misery, devastate families and destroy communities. The need for remembrance is as clear now as it has ever been. May we help our children to learn the lessons of history, that they may be better equipped to avoid repeating the errors of past generations; and may we take the time to pray for peace and reconciliation in our troubled world.

(7pm). All are invited and will have the opportunity to light a candle in their memory as we offer our prayers to God.

Remembrance Sunday is on November 14th, and all three churches will be having their normal ceremonies. Jim will be at Ashow (9.30) and Stoneleigh (10.50) where the names from the respective memorials will be read and their lives honoured in the traditional ways. Leek Wootton's ceremonies begin in Church at 10am, and then with the Scouts and Guides, the congregation parades to the Village War Memorial where others gather for the Act of Remembrance at 11am.

The end of November sees the beginning of Advent with the start of our annual Saturday morning Advent Breakfasts, and the Ashow Advent Carols, which is at 7.30pm this year to avoid a clash with the Churches Together in Kenilworth & District Advent service at St. Francis (6pm).

A STONELEIGH HISTORY SOCIETY?

Sheila Woolf's recent publication 'ANOTHER COUNTRY The Story of Stoneleigh Men in the Great War' is a scholarly and fascinating, yet ultimately tragic account of the lives and experiences of the thirteen Stoneleigh men who gave their lives in the Great War,1914 to 1918. Their names are of course remembered on the memorial plaque under the Royal British Legion flag on the north wall of Stoneleigh Church.

Sheila's book reveals the extraordinary depth and range of the research that went into her remarkable work. In discussing this aspect with Sheila she said that she would now like to work with others on a comprehensive historical record of Stoneleigh from its earliest days through to the present.

Perhaps, then, there might be a sufficient number of us here in Stoneleigh or the joint parish who would have a common interest in establishing a History Society with the aim of carrying out research and study into the intriguing history of our parishes, villages and communities, from earliest times through to the present. This idea immediately appealed to me. Accordingly the purpose of this article is to enquire if there are other like-minded readers who would like to be involved in the time consuming and extensive but absorbing research into how our villages became what they are today. Much has already been written about our buildings, their history and architecture, Stoneleigh Abbey and the Leigh family but the fascinating part of this idea would be in the identification of, research into and compilation of a comprehensive record of all available sources, whether it be family or personal recollection, the Record Offices or Public Registers.

Warwickshire's Best Village Competition 2010

Forty villages in Warwickshire entered this competition, run by the Warwickshire Rural Community Council. There were several categories, and a group of us from Stoneleigh waited nervously to see whether we had won anything when the prizes were announced at the awards ceremony at Wolston Community Centre on 22nd September. Sadly, we came away emptyhanded!

For *Community Projects* we entered our popular village lunches run by the W.I.; the Stoneleigh Male Voice Choir which raises so much money for charity and the Stoneleigh Action Group against HS2 for working so hard on behalf of the village.

For *Environment* we entered the Meadows Society's work to ensure the long-lasting benefits of this beautiful area, and the work done by the churchyard volunteers to keep it looking so well-groomed.

For *History and Heritage* we entered the publication of *Harry Edmunds' Diary* to illustrate life in the village in the early 20th century, and *Another Country* to reveal knowledge gathered about the village contribution to WW1.

For *Business in the Community* we entered the restoration of the Forge and the upkeep of the village green.

For *Communication* we entered the *Stoneleigh and Ashow News* and the new Stoneleigh village website.

The overall winners were Marton, with a gold, a silver and two bronze awards; Bubbenhall were joint second with Quinton. It was interesting to see what goes on in other villages: for example Long Itchington elicited the help of no fewer than 28 village organisations to make pledges to help the environment. We did feel at a distinct disadvantage, however, without a village shop, school or post office, all of which act as hubs for community activities. Nevertheless it was a useful experience to put an entry together; my thanks to all those who contributed material, and who came to the awards evening.

STONELEIGH NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



Not a good month. A lot of vandalism at the end of September on and near the village hall. Sadly, it is thought, by local young people. The police have been informed and some action taken, including more police visits and patrols.

The police have also issued a warning about a telephone scam, claiming to be from BT, telling the recipient their phone line was being disconnected because of an unpaid bill. Immediate payment of £31 by credit card would prevent this or it would cost £118 to reconnect later. The recipient paid the bills by direct debit so was very suspicious. He was given an 0800 number to ring but didn't do so . He was then told to try ringing someone and found his line was dead. When the caller rang back he was again challenged and he rang off. On investigation it was found that the 0800 number was incorrect for BT and the criminal could cut off the recipients phone by not hanging up his own. So be very careful of any phone calls demanding money.

In the run up to Christmas the police have issued a few reminders. Anything left in a parked car, even a carrier bag, can be a temptation for thieves. Don't leave presents or empty present boxes inside or out where they can be seen. When shopping don't leave purses, wallets, keys or mobile phones in your basket or trolley, keep them zipped in your bag (which should be very close to you) or in an inside pocket.

The only other local crime has been at Baginton and Warwick University (again).

NEWS FROM VICARAGE ROAD

Noise Pollution

Over the last year we have seen an increase in noise pollution from the Showground during the day and night.

Saturday 12th September, the Environmental Health Office witnessed noise from the Dressage Show, loud speakers, bleepers and buzzers and during the evening a party of 300 people without adequate management and inacceptable noise levels.

Subsequently, the showground licence is being reviewed and a Noise Abatement notice has been issued to them.

You Can Help:

If you witness unacceptable noise levels in and around your home, please contact the Environmental Health Office and let them know. Weekends and out of office hours the answermachine is monitored so please leave you name and contact details.

Smell Pollution

Since the earlier part of the year when Severn Trent pumping station was altered, Vicarage Road has suffered from foul sewage smells.

It has been identified now that The Showground has been discharging untreated sewage into the pumping station, which thus caused the corrosion earlier this year. Since works have been carried out a vent has been placed in the pipe causing the smells from the highly septic discharge to be released.

The Showground have also been issued from The Environmental Health Office a rectification notice to resolve. Severn Trent are supplying the showground with equipment and a third Party chemical company YARA will advise on how to dose the waste before it is pumped to Vicarage road.

Severn Trent have also been told to seal the pipe from the Showground to Vicarage road to ensure no future smells due to mechanical failure at the showground are released.

I will advise when the works have been completed, so further action if required can be reported again.

The Church Clock

The PCC have decided that a complete overhaul of the church clock is overdue. The clock face shows signs of age and needs to be replaced. We have now signed a contract for its replacement with a replica in the same style.

At the same time company have been asked to do a complete overhaul of the mechanism and install an electronic winding gear that can be operated from the ground floor so that it will not be necessary to climb the tower steps as Ces has done for so many years. This is not intended to imply any criticism of Ces's ability to continue but is a part recognition that, like all of us, he is not getting any younger!

Over the last five years we have had a number of individual legacies and these have been set aside for such an occasion as this. This fund amounts to £3,900 and this will be used towards the total repair costs of £9,935.

The Harvest Lunch

The Ashow/Stoneleigh joint Harvest lunch ended up with a surplus and, including the money raised by the sale of the produce, enabled us to add £223 to the September charity collections of both churches of £156. The cheque for £379 has been sent to the Addington Fund which is a farming charity that assists farming families who are having a difficult time because of illness of the breadwinner.

LEMON BISCUITS

(This recipe comes from Marie Nock, via Sheila Skinner, who writes: "I made the biscuits for the last W.I. meeting and they were given top marks! Lovely!")



175g unsalted butter, or baking margarine 100g caster sugar 225g plain flour Finely grated lemon zest and 2 tbsp of lemon juice 25g demerara sugar

- 1. Beat butter, sugar, lemon rind and juice until light and fluffy.
- 2. Stir in flour and knead mixture together.
- 3. Divide into 2 portions and form into a sausage shape. Coat with demerara sugar. (Shaping works well using cling film.)
- 4. Wrap in cling film and leave in fridge until firm. About an hour.
- 5. Slice "sausages" into circles. Makes about 40, depending on size of "sausages."
- 6. Place on baking trays, using baking paper to prevent sticking.
- 7. Bake at 160C/325F/Reg3 for 10-12 minutes.



THEFT and UNSOCIABLE BEHAVIOUR in STONELEIGH

Some two years ago the Village Hall and Playing Fields Trust wrote an article in this magazine entitled "Defacing of the Village Hall", in which we asked for help in reporting any instance of vandalism to the Committee or to the relevant Neighbourhood Watch representative for passing on to the Police.

Unfortunately the unsociable behaviour/vandalism has continued now including theft, alas very few reports have been received by the Police.

We are all guilty of criticising the local police force for lack of action and apparent lack of interest in the problems of the village. Having discussed the situation with representatives of the Warwickshire Police - Warwick Rural Safer Neighbourhoods Team, it became apparent that the Police and we the inhabitants in this area, could and must improve our communications.

As far as our village (and any other local village) is concerned we should understand what the Police are trying to achieve and how we should go about reporting incidents.

Our local 'Safer Neighbourhoods' Team is based on Kenilworth and looks after some dozen or so smaller communities, their duty is self evident ie to build together safer neighbourhoods. They have two uniformed officers and two PCSO's who between them cover all our areas, they admit they could well do with extra bodies but that's not a possibility in the current economic climate; they need your help in reporting incidents.

METHODS of REPORTING INCIDENTS:

SERIOUS - DIAL 999

These incidents cover not only eg serious car crashes, offences using firearms, collapse of inhabited structures etc but any incident which could lead to personal injury

such as 'running over the roof of a Village Hall', 'destroying traffic warning signs', out of control 'late night parties' etc

Give as much information as you can; the operator will decide the priority and where to route the given details for appropriate action

LESS SERIOUS - DIAL: 01926 451111

This is the contact for our local Safer Neighbourhood Team During daytime you may be answered by one of the team; if they are all out on patrol, please leave a message.

If you feel after some time that there has been no response and that the situation is ongoing, call **999**
