Stoneleigh Church Clock

Our cover picture this month shows Cec White winding the church clock at St Mary's for the very last time as, during the past few weeks, the clock has been overhauled and an electric winding and control system fitted.

When Smiths of Derby carried out the annual service of the clock in June 2009 it was noticed that the dial was in poor condition with some rotting woodwork; it was recommended that the dial works should be stripped and serviced and the strike weight pulley repaired. At that time it was only possible to undertake essential work. Subsequently, consideration was also given to the possibility of installing automatic winding as has been done in many other churches.

The task of winding the clock had been done by Cec White for the past 20 years and he was quite willing to continue with this weekly task for as long as he remained able. Few of us will have climbed the 18 very narrow, worn, tapering, spiral stone steps that lead to the clock mechanism and for which the only safety aid is a length of old bell rope used as a handrail. Fewer still will have operated the heavy winding handles – 75 rotations each week to keep the clock running and the bell chiming. Cec must have negotiated 40,000 steps in those 20 years – 20000 towards heaven and 20,000 back again, and given those handles nearly 80,000 turns!

Now we have a shiny new clock face and, behind the scenes, an automatic clock. Most of the work is finished and all that remains is to fit the electronic pendulum regulator which will ensure that the clock gives us absolute accuracy. In the meantime, Cec will be chuckling to himself as the 'new fangled mechanics' are gaining more than one minute each week. It was never like that in his day! So many things are taken for granted and often only appreciated when they cease. We have all taken the time from the church clock without, perhaps, appreciating the dedication of the "weekly winder". Thank you Cec, and now "thank you" to the PCC for ensuring that we can continue to take our time from the church clock; and, of course, thanks go to all those who contributed to

church funds to allow the £9935 refurbishment of the church clock.

From the Vicarage:

There is an old 'Sunday School Chorus' which goes:

The best book to read is the Bible, the best book to read is the Bible.

If you read it every day, it will help you on your way,

Oh, the best book to read is the Bible.

As you probably know 2011 has been declared the 'Year of the Bible' as we celebrate the 400th anniversary of the publication of the 'King James Authorised Version'. There are many more modern translations and paraphrases available now, but for lots of people the "King James" still holds a special place in their hearts. They speak of the beauty and majesty of the old language, and how the words they grew up with took root in their hearts so that familiar Bible passages remain there.

To me, however, the beauty and majesty is in the message, not in the language. I grew up at a time when translators were bringing the timeless message of the Good News of God's love for his creation into the language of the late 20th century rather than the early 17th. It helped me to appreciate that it was a message for NOW, not just for the past. It introduced me to a God who is alive and active in his world and with those who commit their lives to follow him. I remember one experience early in my 'adult' Christian life, when I was a member of the youth group at a church in Essex: four of us decided to embark on a 24-hour sponsored Bible Reading. Interestingly, some years later the four individuals became two married couples! What I learnt then, apart from the actual reading, was that it is possible to read the entire New Testament together with about 7% of the Old Testament, out loud in 24 hours which if expanded means that it would take about 3½ days to read the entire Bible out loud, or about 40 hours to read it to yourself. In other words, 7 minutes per day would let you read the whole Bible in a year. There's a challenge for 2011.

Also, there is a great opportunity to listen to the whole New Testament being read by a variety of actors in forty ½hour sections. It is freely available on the Bible Society website (www.biblesociety.org.uk) under the title You've Got the Time. It is offered as a plan for Lent – but is available now and you can download the whole lot onto your computer or put it on your iPod etc. I don't think King James could have begun to imagine what he had started when he commanded that the Bible be brought to the people through his Authorised Version translation, but as a 'James' myself, I would like to think he would approve.

Whether you read for seven minutes or more, or listen to the 'podcasts', the best book to read/listen to is still the Bible.

HIGH SPEED RAIL - LATEST

The Government has published its revised proposed route for HS2. The proposed route will now pass through Stoneleigh Park, in a cutting, a bit further from Stoneleigh than the original plan, but closer to Ashow; it still badly affects several properties in the parish. The campaign against the scheme as currently envisaged continues. There is to be a public consultation exercise, due be announced shortly, after which the Coalition Government will decide whether or not the scheme should go ahead, and will then provide details of the type of compensation available for those whose properties have to be demolished.

Coventry and Warwickshire are amongst those local authorities who have voted against HS2 amidst fears that it could damage the economy of West Midlands towns and cities, except Birmingham.

Phil Bull attended a recent meeting of the Parish Council which subsequently voted in favour of increasing its precept to support opposition to HS2. This decision is much appreciated.

The Stoneleigh Action Group will announce further activities once the details of the public consultation are announced.


STONELEIGH MALE VOICE CHOIR - THANKS


An Orchard for Stoneleigh
