HIGH SPEED RAIL LATEST

There has been no lull in the campaigns surround the proposals for High Speed Rail between London and Birmingham, and beyond. Political lobbying, press campaigns and individual representations have continued vigorously despite the end of the official consultation period on 31 July. (For Stoneleigh Action Group's response on your behalf, see www.stoneleighvillage.org.uk). the village website Everyone concerned about the likely effects of the proposed scheme is encourtheir aged to make views knows at http://epetitions.direct.gov.uk/petitions/353 The Government has stated that any petitions reaching over 100,000 signatures will be given time for discussion in Parliament.

There has been considerable publicity following a statement that written petitions would not count towards the numbers gathered electronically. This in effect disenfranchised the c100,000 people who had signed petitions at various events since the HS2 proposal was announced. However, following a public outcry, it has now been announced that there is a possible way round this via the Backbench Business Committee and at the time of writing a debate on HS2 is scheduled for Thursday 13 October. Watch this space!

An attempt has been made to bring the various threads of the anti HS2 campaign together in one website www.betterthanhs2.org This includes AGHAST (Action Groups Against High Speed Two) which is a federation of 72 local groups (including Stoneleigh) and two national organisations - HS2 Action Alliance (mainly research) and Stop HS2 (mainly campaigning).

Stoneleigh Park – Estate Management

Public meeting

The new management team for the Stoneleigh Park estate wants to meet with local residents on the evening of Thursday 27 October to talk about their long-term plans to modernise the park and attract new tenants. Many residents will be aware that the Royal Agricultural Society of England granted a lease of the 1,047 hectare estate in December 2010 in a deal that could bring up to £50 million in investment over the next 10 years. LaSalle Investment Management was appointed to bring to Stoneleigh Park its experience of creating and managing thriving science parks.

LaSalle director Andrew Bull, backed up by RASE chief executive Denis Chamberlain, will set out his ideas for modernising the park's facilities and attracting the tenants that will secure the park's prosperity. Andrew hopes to be able to talk about progress made in diverting the park's traffic away from Stoneleigh village.

The meeting is endorsed by local MP, Jeremy Wright, who will be chairing a discussion of the proposals – so long as Parliamentary business allows him to get away from Westminster in time.

All residents of Stoneleigh, Ashow and the immediate area are invited. The meeting will take place in Stoneleigh Park's Princethorpe Suite (next to Stoneleigh Park Lodge) from 7pm to 8.30pm on Thursday 27 October. Light refreshments will be provided.

The state of the church building.

Every five years we are bound by church law to commission an architect's detailed report on the state of the church building called the Quinquennial Review and the 2010 review document came to us in June 2011.

One would think that after all the work done, and money spent, that this review would be a good one; well it is, up to a point. It recognises the work carried out over the last 5 years, but, given the age of the building it also identifies the ongoing problems and sets the degrees of their priority over the next five years. We have two areas that require urgent attention; they are the nave roof and certain areas of stonework.

The priority is the nave roof.

An inspection of the roof cavity has established that the copper roof is sagging between the rafters with the original support, possibly chipboard, having sagged through absorbing moisture over the possible 40 years since the roof was installed. The copper is in danger of cracking and there is no way short of replacement that can prevent water penetration if this occurs.

The stonework on areas like window sills is letting in water.

Certain areas of stonework like widow sills and other parts exposed to water penetration urgently need to be refaced to prevent the continuing effects of frost upon these vulnerable spots; work on other areas can be left to later in the overall task.

What will it cost?

We have established through a survey of estimated costs that the total bill could be £263,295. with the roof costing £70,000 and the stonework £50,000. The balance is made up of costs for scaffolding (£42.500.); professional fees (£28,462.); VAT at 20% (£43,882.) and other administrative costs of £28,450.

What are we doing about it?

We have already made appeals to two national charities for help. The Headley Trust, a Sainsbury family charity, has received our appeal for help with the roof; this was submitted by 8^{th} August. We shall not know the outcome of this before mid- November. The other appeal is to the National Churches Trust (NCT who have asked us to re-frame our general appeal into one "for slightly less than £50,000 including fees". This will to be submitted by 30th of September to the NCT with the support of the local County Trust.

Where to now?

It is early days yet but we are planning a programme to raise money by events in the church and village hall. We will be appealing to other charities for outside help and we shall also be making a public appeal to old and new friends. S.G.C. & I.N.S.

Howard's Way

Howard's Way was meticulous, uncompromising idiosyncratic. It came to Ashow in 1983 when Howard purchased 6 The Long Row, and immediately removed all the DIY work of its previous owner... and did it properly. Windows were rubbed down using five different grades of sandpaper, and were primed, undercoated, and triple top-coated. Tiles were re-hung in straight lines. The heating was re-designed with so many controls that the boiler became neurotic. A watering system for the hanging baskets was installed, fed from the upstairs WC cistern, into which was dropped a handful of Tomorite so that the flowers received a liquid feed as well! Villagers looked on with amusement, which morphed into fascination and admiration. Here was someone with all the skills and the ability, dedication and patience to apply them to perfection. No short cuts. No second best. No time for those aspire towards did not the highest standards. Unsurprisingly, he became indispensable. When anything broke down or needed improving, we would 'call for Howard'. What shall we do without him?

Howard brought the same fastidious approach to his work on the Parish Council. No detail of planning was too small, and no statement of policy too grand to be questioned exhaustively. He was resolute in highlighting waste and inefficiency in local government. Howard treasured living in Ashow and, as a councillor, devoted countless hours to safeguarding and enhancing the local environment.

Howard's End was cruel. Would that he had died suddenly, on a sunny day, on his allotment, in his trademark shorts and sandals, while picking yet another prize-winning marrow. Let us remember with fond affection and give thanks for all that he did for Ashow and the parishes. And for reminding us that for a job to be done well, there is only one way - Howard's Way.

From the Vicarage:

Thanksgiving: It is the word at the heart of Harvest Festivals. As we move from the month of September, with the last vestiges of Summer, into October with its decidedly Autumn feel, it can be easy to feel downhearted: less natural light and heat, less colour, less cricket! Already the shops – and indeed planning within the Church – turn our thoughts towards Christmas rather than Summer Holidays. But this moment of Harvest Thanksgiving gives us something special. As the hymn puts it, "All is safely gathered in, 'ere the winter storms begin" It may not have been the best harvest with the weather problems earlier in the year, but it still comes as a constant reminder to us that, in this 'green and pleasant land', we have so much to be thankful for. So much that we take for granted, but which the vast majority of people in this world could only dream about: safe water coming uninterrupted out of our own taps in our own houses, a ready supply of good and varied food available day by day, electricity as the flick of a switch. Even the vast majority of the 'poor' in this land enjoy the opportunity of these things.

Thanksgiving: Even if you do not believe that there is any God, let alone the loving benevolent God known and proclaimed by those who follow the Christian faith, you cannot reasonably claim that you have earned the right to be here rather than in another less pleasant, less fruitful part of this planet. Accidents of heredity and birth can hardly be attributed to our own efforts however successful or otherwise we have been with our lives since. We should respond by not just being thankful, but by giving thanks. Appreciating all those who have been involved in providing and maintaining our way of life, and saying thank you to them or for them, helps us to break out of the culture of self-centredness which so badly affects English society – and if you do believe in God, what should be more natural than saying thank you to Him as the source of everything.

Thanksgiving: Another way of looking at the word is to show our Thanks by Giving. Once we appreciate that so much of what we have and enjoy is ours more by accident than by right, then we should have sufficient concern for those who 'have not' to eagerly desire to share with them. Those who offer 'Harvest Gifts' this year at our services will be helping to provide for the needy in Leamington through the work of "Steph & Geoff" and their team of helpers at Leamington Christian Mission – but such giving should be a way of life, rather than a one-off event. John 3:16, one of the most famous verses in the Bible, begins "God so loved the world, that he gave..." May our desire be to follow that example – both giving thanks and thankfully giving.


