## **Resident of Stoneleigh; Lord Mayor of Coventry!**

Tim Sawdon's year as Lord Mayor of Coventry began in style – he and Nicky were married just hours before taking office! With this unique beginning to his year as Lord Mayor, Tim might well have foreseen what interesting times lay ahead of him. And what a year it was: the Queen's Diamond Jubilee, of course, but also the Golden Jubilee of Coventry Cathedral, and an Olympic year, with sporting events taking place right here in the city. In fact, Tim found himself in a good position to challenge the "London 2012" nomenclature when he was introduced to FIFA president Sepp Blatter., who presented Tim with a London 2012 pennant. "What about *Coventry* 2012?" was Tim's response—and to his credit Blatter organised a Coventry 2012 pennant, which now hangs proudly in the Council House.

Tim has been a City Councillor for 39 years, a fact which obviously amazes him. He became a councillor because he wanted to play his part in improving the lives of ordinary people, and as such has represented Wainbody Ward for all that time. When he became Lord Mayor, having become the longest-serving councillor in his turn, he was equally keen to help a variety of organisations in the city. Accordingly he decided, as part of his Lord Mayor's charity, to work with the Heart of England Community Foundation, which enabled grant aid to be given to a number of deserving groups in the city, rather than nominating one or two, as has been more traditional. "I have been enormously impressed by the sheer number of voluntary groups around the city," Tim says. "Everything from Sea Cadets to caring for the elderly. It's the people who make the place." Thus he has been able to assist many organisations working with some of the most disadvantaged members of the community.

What have been the highlights of Tim and Nicky's very special year? They have visited China, and Russia, to link up with Coventry's twin cities of Jinan and Volgograd. Trips to Kiel and Cork, two more of Coventry's twins, have also been made. In fact, of the 500 or so engagements a Lord Mayor can expect in his year of office, some may last for only fifteen minutes, others for several days. But unusually Tim and Nicky have been

able to meet two archbishops of Canterbury! At the Golden Jubilee of Coventry Cathedral they were able to meet Rowan Williams, and more recently as part of his pilgrimage around the country, “Coventry’s own” Justin Welby. Oh, and Princess Anne has been a frequent visitor, coming to the cathedral, but also to a Citizens’ Advice Bureau event and to open an engineering block at Coventry University. One of the perks of being Lord Mayor is the chance to observe the way royalty works: “On one of those occasions I had to introduce her to ninety-four people,” Tim recalls, “and she stopped and talked to each one of them. Impressive.”

The real highlights, however, have been witnessing the pleasure brought to people by key events in the city’s life, or in the life of an organisation within it. The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress have many events to attend, but for each of those events it is the organisation’s “special day.” Tim speaks with real pleasure of the opportunity afforded to three children from Grange Farm Primary School, of which he is a Governor. The children had won the chance to shadow the Lord Mayor for the day and they obviously relished their time at the cutting edge of local politics. “They were such bright kids,” Tim says, “and asked really good questions.”

Tim and Nicky have put together a number of albums to remind them of their year, and it will inevitably be with some regret that they hand over their chains of office in May, to the current deputy and his wife. It has not been entirely easy for either of them to combine such a whirl of activity with work, but as Tim reverts to being a “mere” councillor again, they will have much to remember from a special year in Coventry’s history – and their own.

## **Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update**

Despite the flooding followed by the freeze that marked the winter of 2012 and early spring of 2013 it would seem that the orchard is thriving and is very much on the cusp of springing back to life.

The orchard group look forward to developing plans for the coming growing season. Those of you who have walked down to the meadow will have seen that a small additional area has been acquired courtesy of the “Meadows Society” within which a new line of trees has already started to be planted. The group have plans for this line to be completed and for an additional line of “dwarf” apple trees to be planted within the new area during a community planting event to be held this coming Autumn. We hope that this will be as enjoyable an event as that held during December 2011 which was a great success as well as a lot of fun !

The Community Orchard at this point in time relies heavily on the generosity of the residents of Stoneleigh and even more so now that the LEADER funding has been used up. Thanks to all those who have contributed and become a “Friend of the Orchard” during 2012 and we look forward to their continued support during 2013. The fund generated has already enabled an early season grass cut to occur, thanks once again to the efforts of John Craine of Glebe Nurseries as well as the purchase of some Oxeye daisy wild flower seed which is hoped will complement and add to an ongoing germination resulting from the 2012 sowing.

The Stoneleigh village orchard can still very much be considered a “project in development” and it is hoped that our community can look forward to and participate in its incremental development on a yearly basis.

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### **HIGH SPEED RAIL LATEST**

There is not a great deal to report locally this month. As it happens, there is a Warwickshire County Council meeting about HS2 on 19 April, the next bilateral meeting with Hs2 Ltd engineers is scheduled for 23 April, and the Stoneleigh Action Group has a meeting with Jeremy Wright M.P. on 3 May. There will be a report on these in the next News. Concerns about the recent announcement about a construction site between Stoneleigh and the A46 have been expressed to the County/District/Parish Councils and will continue to be raised at every possible opportunity. Do **YOU** care about this development? If so, please help us fight it.

Nationally, the Hs2Alliance and Stop HS2 groups have been very active, briefing newly-formed action groups along the 'Y' route north of Birmingham, briefing journalists and MPs, and providing material for programmes such as *Newsnight* which recently featured an item on compensation (another programme, on the flawed business case, is in the pipeline).

## Stoneleigh History Society

The March meeting included our AGM, looking back at the year's achievements and ahead at some exciting plans. In May we shall be mounting an exhibition in the Leigh Chapel, containing many old photographs of people and places in the village, as well as a timeline of events in Stoneleigh from the year AD100 onwards! Do come along and look; we have been delighted to be able to copy pictures brought to us in the past, and would welcome more. Please don't throw anything away! If you have pictures or documents which may be of relevance to village history, please consider allowing us to see them. Between May 18<sup>th</sup> and June 2<sup>nd</sup> our exhibition will coincide with the "Leamington Looks Back" History Festival, and teas will be available in the church on the Bank Holiday weekend – please see the church article for details.

Our speaker in March was Bruce Smith, an authority on Drove Roads. It was good to welcome several visitors to the talk, some of whom had specialist knowledge to add to the speaker's. After a general introduction to the subject, he produced a fascinating map, created in 1675, showing quite clearly that what we now know as the B4115 was part of a sheep drovers' road between Gloucester and Coventry. Members of the Society determined to verify that our own Swan Inn (aka The Club!) was once a stopping-place for drovers and their livestock, were thrilled to discover that a key marker for "likely places to stay the night" was the presence of two fir trees nearby, planted by earlier drovers. The meeting on April 30<sup>th</sup> will be an informal discussion on future projects. As ever we should be pleased to see new members, especially newcomers to the village. The meeting begins at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. On May 28<sup>th</sup> there will be presentations on the village workhouse, and on James Wentworth Leigh.
