50th Anniversary "Cambridge" Peal Attempt on Stoneleigh's Bells

n Friday 6th February 2015, beginning at about 1.00pm, a full peal attempt of a method called "Cambridge Surprise Minor" will be made on Stoneleigh's six bells. This consists of nearly three hours of continuous ringing and is a considerable challenge for the people taking part. Three hours of ringing - along a constantly changing path for all the bells and without any major slip-ups - is both mentally and physically draining. (The entire "Cambridge" method must be memorised; there are no other aids.) The reason why it is happening at this time is as follows.

For some sixty years prior to Easter 1957, Stoneleigh's five bells were completely silent due to structural problems. When the tower and bell frame were eventually repaired, a completely new band of bellringers had to be trained from scratch. Some Stoneleigh residents will doubtless remember Paul and Gill Williamson and their young sons, Peter and Michael, who lived in Stoneleigh from 1957 until leaving for Somerset in 1968. Paul and Gill were experienced bellringers, who contributed greatly towards the communal effort of getting Stoneleigh tower ringing properly again, including teaching their sons to ring.

Thanks to Cec White, there is a copy of a "Kenilworth Weekly News" article hanging in Stoneleigh's ringing room, dated Friday 16th October 1965. This reports on the recommencement of ringing at our church, accompanied by a picture of some of the band at that time - comprising the then Tower Captain, Mr F Grant, Paul Williamson, Sheila Rench, Celia King, Edward and Nicholas Fardon, Miss A Woodward, Paul Groocock, Ken Hancox and Valerie Jones. (Gill Williamson gets a mention in the text of the article.) Members of this band rang the first full peal on the bells on 3rd June 1962; three members were in fact ringing their first ever peal.

In early 1963, a treble was added, making the current ring of six bells. The first peal on the six bells was rung for Churchill's funeral in 1965. It was

performed on 5th February 1965, although the funeral service had been held on 30th January. The peal band was from Kenilworth and Warwick, and included one member (Tony Cox) who was ringing his first peal.

Today, Paul and Gill Williamson continue to live in Somerset; Paul had to give up ringing several years ago and Gill can only ring for short spells now. Paul and Gill's son, Peter, has arranged the fiftieth anniversary peal at Stoneleigh, when the band of bellringers will include three members of the original line-up. This anniversary celebration has the enthusiastic backing of our vicar and churchwardens. We wish Peter Williamson's peal band all the best and hope that the attempt is a successful one.

HS2 Latest

ince the last report, many developments have taken place regarding the HS2 proposals. These include evidence to the House of Commons Select Committee. For details, see www.parliament.uk/business/committees/committees-a-z/commons-select/high-speed-rail-london-west-midlands-bill-select-committee-commons.

The House of Lords hearings on the economic case for HS2 were presented with plenty of evidence which challenges official assertions about the project. Almost 530 pages of evidence can be found on http://www.parliament.uk/documents/lords-committees/economic-affairs/Economic-case-for-HS2/HS2-Online-Evidence-Volume.pdf.

Locally, discussions have continued between the Parish Council, StAG and the Stoneleigh History Society regarding their respective petitions. The current view is that it is important to present these petitions personally to the Select Committee because, at the very least, this means that our legitimate concerns will be recorded and no one from HS2 Ltd can argue subsequently that these issues were not raised. The extent to which concerns and any offers of mitigation result in action remains to be seen but, certainly until Parliament makes its decision on the Hybrid Bill, your local representatives will continue to do all that they can to register disquiet about the HS2 project and the way it will impact on all residents. The date for local petitions to be heard has yet to be announced, but is expected to be before the publication of the next News.



In Conversation with Emma Clayton

mma Clayton is a writer of children's novels and has recently moved to Stoneleigh. Her first book *The Roar* was released in 2008, and in 2009 was nominated for the Carnegie Medal and won the Yorkshire Coast Book Award. In 2010, it was selected for the USBBY Outstanding International Books Honour List as well as the Texas Lone Star Reading List. Its sequel, *The Whisper*, will be available to buy in February 2015.



When did you decide to become a writer?

I didn't make a conscious decision to become a writer. While I was a student, I wrote a screenplay and I enjoyed that so much that I decided to write something longer. Writing became my hobby because it made me happy, but I didn't call myself a writer until I was published.

What genre are your books and why this particular genre?

My first two novels, *The Roar* and *The Whisper*, are dystopian thrillers. I chose this genre because I wanted to write for children on the cusp of adolescence who'd given up on books because they couldn't find ones they liked and had consequently turned to computer games and movies. I figured if I could offer something relevant, I might be able to keep them on the book wagon.

What's *The Roar* about and where do your ideas come from? In 2050, the Northern Government opens new arcades and encourages poor children to play an addictive game called POD FIGHTER. Twelve-year-old Mika knows the game is not a game, but he competes to find the man who stole his sister.

The Roar is the sound of anger and The Whisper is the sound of thoughtful contemplation. The themes of the novels are issues that we face today, so my ideas came from the world I observe. However, at its heart, this is an adventure story inspired by the Steven Spielberg movies I watched as a child, and the iconography of computer games.

Do you work to an outline or plot or do you prefer just to see where an idea takes you?

I try to stick to an outline, but I often get carried away!

What is the hardest thing about writing?

Working alone. But moving to Stoneleigh has helped. It is a beautiful, friendly village with an interesting history. Despite the threats of Gateway and HS2, I feel lucky to live here.

Why has the sequel taken so long and is it part of a series? *The Whisper* took a long time to write because it's a book about war for children. I felt this subject could not be rushed.

Are you working on anything at the moment?

Yes, I'm currently writing an adventure novel for younger readers. It's great fun!



have done a fair amount of travelling in the last year as a commuter. I, alongside many others, have become very familiar with my route to work and, as with all journeys, it does not always go according to plan. The timing of my trip influences its ease and speed, of course, so it didn't take very long driving home after the midnight service last Christmas Eve, for example. (There weren't many people up and about in the small hours – just me and Father Christmas!) However, it took an age to get to church on Rogation Sunday, stuck behind cyclists and farm machinery.


Then there's the weather, which has in fact so far been less challenging than I had anticipated – although I had a memorable white-knuckle drive through high winds whilst Classic FM (my favourite travelling companion) played Beethoven's Fifth! Notice that I am not making mention of roadworks. I confess that I am struggling to find a printable comment.

Some travelling plans are utterly interrupted, of course; as was the case for us as a family two years ago. The scene of the car crash at tea-time on Christmas Eve as we travelled between nativity services is one that I will never forget. Three cars were written off because a busy person overtook us on a solid white line, choosing to take the risk to get home five minutes sooner and considering their journey the most important of all. He and we and others nearly never made it home at all because of that moment of rash decision. But I will also not forget the kindness of strangers who stopped to help the angel Gabriel (Fliss) and the shepherds (Ben and Timmy), the vicar (my husband) and the distressed mother (me). It was a peculiarly poignant scene amongst the broken glass and bits of metal. I gathered my precious family to me, astounded that we had all managed to walk away relatively unharmed. Once home, we dusted ourselves off, and Chris and I continued into the night taking Christmas services, with the reality of what we'd been through only really hitting us in delayed shock on Christmas Day.

Over this festive period, many people take on extra journeys to gather with family and friends, so I hope you take the greatest of care as you go. In the Christmas story we are invited to travel once again to Bethlehem. In the familiar story itself and its themes, journey is a strong thread: pregnant Mary with Joseph and a donkey; shepherds running through the night; wise men from distant lands; angels from heaven and God come to us in a baby.

Travel with me to Bethlehem as we immerse ourselves into the Christmas story and explore these other journeys together. I hope that you include a trip down the church path to join us and hope too that our journey to Bethlehem will be memorable for all the right reasons. Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update

he Stoneleigh Orchard Project continues to gather momentum, and it is with some amazement that this year many of the orchard trees produced a small but welcome maiden harvest. This was quite an assuring outcome, given the inception of the orchard was only three years ago! The maiden harvest has already been processed to cider, albeit of small volume, which holds some promise for harvests in the future and is an opportunity to repay all those members of the community who have shown faith in the project and to whom the orchard group owe a debt of gratitude.

This autumn, the group started to focus on developing the skills required to develop a craft cider, and it's our hope that a product can be developed that will make the venture self-sustaining as well as providing support for other village resources. Indeed, the cider processing facility has also recently been engaged in assisting a local farm to develop a Perry. Although purely on a trial and experimental basis at this point in time, it offers possibilities for the future.

It is our intention to continue the wild flower coverage of the meadow following the positive feedback concerning the remembrance wild flower area on display earlier in the year.

The "River and Meadows" subgroup is currently in the process of planning the installation of bird and bat boxes to be distributed throughout the area; something that may well have been implemented by the time that this magazine has been received.

It is also planned to hold a quiz in the Village Club early in the New Year, which we hope will go towards assisting with the finances of the Orchard Project.

The orchard group welcomes new members for an annual fee of £10, and wants to thank existing members for their continuing support. Donations can be made to Pete Freeman (Chairman) or to Richard Hancox (Treasurer). Cheques should be made payable to **Stoneleigh Village Community Orchard**. 
