# **Living Stones**

Although St Mary the Virgin church in Stoneleigh is temporarily a building site, the local church is nevertheless alive and well, worshipping elsewhere in the village hall, the club and with our friends at Ashow and reaching out into the community with the love of Jesus which is always our mission. I, for one, welcome the opportunities to be even more outside our four walls and think creatively outside the box pews. The present situation reminds me of the Bible verse which describes the church as living stones. 1 Peter 2 verse 5 talks about the church, the people of God, being living stones being built together into a spiritual house.

I think we are all learning a lot in this process, not least some of the stonemasonry terms. **Repointing**, of course, is the process of renewing the pointing, which is the external part of mortar joints, in masonry construction. Over time, weathering and decay causes holes in between masonry bricks and stones, letting the water in thus causing damage over time. Being less technical and au fait with the skills and terms of stonemasonry, as I understand it, this is about refreshing the squidge that holds it all together to make it fit for purpose. For us living stones, the analogy follows. As the actual building is being worked on, one of the things we are discovering in a fresh way is what holds the church together. Not the building but the fellowship, the special sharing we have that comes in worshipping together and praying together. Before the days of the institution of church and the buildings we associate with that, people who loved and followed Jesus were church. Outside of our own buildings we are still church.

We have a technical term for the squidge which holds us all together and makes us fit for purpose. We still use the Greek as no English word adequately describes it: koinonia. Another Bible verse says that the whole world will be able to identify Christians because they see the love we have for one another. That's incredibly challenging for us mere mortals, especially in the middle of a stressful building project!... as living stones we also need repointing in the right direction, to Jesus the Living Stone, who binds us all together in unity and shows us the best way of being human.

Another specialist skill being carried out on the stonework is the term **defrazzing**. This is (I hope I've understood well enough) when the outside loose bits of the actual stones, again caused by weathering over time, are knocked off, leaving the sound part of the stone, again avoiding voids and crevices that hold water. When I first read this term, I thought it said "defrazzling" – to my mind a great term for shedding the "frazzle", the

overstretched busyness and stresses, which over time does us no good. I thought about how we need the edges knocked off us sometimes, especially as we learn to rub alongside one another; how we need smoothing over so that we don't harbour and hold on to unhelpful grudges or hurts, like the water in the stonework that stagnates or seeps in slowly causing damage. Let's say the "l" I added in to change the word defrazzing to defrazzling stands for love – the love of God changing us inside and out, on the surface and deep inside us, to love like Jesus.

## **Community News**

Now the building work is underway Stoneleigh Church is using different places to worship. August saw the start of our new worship pattern using the club and the village hall. People who attend say they welcome the opportunity to try something new and although logistically challenging at times, change can help us reflect.

In September we held our Harvest Festival service in the village hall followed by lunch - a fantastic spread as everyone brought a dish to share with others, and the puddings were delicious. Ian Bell from the Addington Fund, which is one of the charities we support, told us about the work they do to support the farming community.



You may well have found, if you have tried to access the church in the last few weeks, that the door is locked. Unfortunately we will be unable to offer the 'open access' we are all used to during the work because, as we said in the last report, we have handed the Church over to Crofts (the Contractors) for the term of the contract. As it is a building site it is their responsibility for keeping everyone safe.

However the contractor has agreed to us having 'escorted access'. A few nominated people have been instructed by the site foreman, Kevin, and they will be responsible for those whom they accompany.

We are really grateful to Crofts for this as it means Sharon still has a place to work and meet people. It will also enable us to continue to hold Midweek Communion services and Thursday Prayer. The Bell Ringers can still practise on a Thursday and ring on a Sunday morning. Our administrator, Jackie, will also be able to use the office but over this period visitors will need to make an appointment rather than just drop in. (See back page for Sharon and Jackie's contact details.)

As we reported last month, the contractors are skilled craftsmen and very keen to share their knowledge. We are planning with them an open day to share their skills with the community and talk about the project, the cost of which will be met by Heritage Lottery. This will all be done safely on the ground in one of their workshops and, as the church building will still not have open access, we hope to also create an opportunity to display the photographs of what is going on out of sight. This should be an interesting experience so please look out for further details in next month's magazine and on our notice board.

Part of the Heritage grant is to provide the church with a new website. The design

was funded in the application stage and now it is our turn to write all the content. Niki Molyneux is leading this part of the project but would appreciate any help if you have time and expertise to share. We are hoping this will go live by Christmas.

We are delighted that on Saturday 15th October Sheila Woolf is giving a talk entitled 'Jane Austen and Stoneleigh' to raise funds for the building. This is a Heritage Lottery sponsored event which means all the ticket money will go into our fund. See the advert on page 9 of the magazine for details.

# Stoneleigh Church Building News

On 8th September the Contractors reported that works were progressing well and they were currently working to programme. However the order of works has changed in that all masonry work on the tower has to be concluded before scaffolding can be erected over the nave roof. The majority of the defrazzing and repointing (more fully described in Rev. Sharon's article) has been done leaving replacement of stonework which should be completed within a fortnight.

Scaffolding has been erected around the East end and along the North face to allow masonry work to start there and by the time this is distributed the interior "birdcage" scaffold will be up in the nave, all lights having been taken down to enable this to be done. Work on taking down the existing ceiling is planned to start in the week commencing 26th September with stripping the gutters and roof a month later.



I regret that, apart from one generous local donation, no more funds have been received so our shortfall is still in the region of £60,000 although we still wait to hear from a number of Trusts. The Architects are currently seeking quotes to see how much of the interior decoration we can achieve whilst the "birdcage" is up.

If anyone has any concerns, or anything that is praiseworthy, about the building works please contact me and not the workforce. I will then relay matters back through the Architects who are the only people authorised to issue changes to the contract. I visit the site every day.

# HS2 LATEST

HS2 continues to, well to be brief, continue.

This month the public was invited to the first half of the Parish Council meeting on 8th September. Representatives from Warwickshire County Council Highways and HS2 were in attendance. The items for presentation to the public included a discussion on the roads during the construction of HS2 around the area, amongst other matters, including a proposed roundabout to the A46 to replace the current slip road system (so it will be more like the Thickthorn interchange). The latter is proposed by WCC regardless of HS2 as the area infrastructure requires enhancement in the light of other proposals.

The timescales for the implementation of this as well as the construction timescale for HS2 are still not firmly defined, although the representatives from HS2 suggested that more work would be done on this after Royal Assent to the Hybrid Bill for HS2.

HS2 staff were urged to extend their collaboration with the community as there are many concerns which need to be discussed and , hopefully, resolved.

I think that the short answer to all of these matters is that they are works in progress by various parties, and time will show what outcomes there have been.

This month also saw the resignation of the Chief Executive of HS2, after having been in post for about 2 years. A true vote of confidence in this major infrastructure project, one might think. Perhaps the salary of about £750,000 is not enough to get by on? One view is that he is going before the truth over the cost and time overruns to the project become apparent.

Just another month in the life of this behemoth.....


