#### **HS2 UPDATE**

Coverage of HS2 in the national and specialist press has continued unabated over the holiday season and beyond. Extensive attention was paid to the suggestion by several senior politicians that costs need to be considered more carefully and the idea has also been mooted that other issues (the NHS, social care and so on) should take priority and the project should be scrapped. That these points were made amidst the feverish climate of decisions over Brexit has raised the hopes of those who have long campaigned for an end to HS2.

There has also been widespread publicity (including in an edition of 'Panorama') to the injustices and inconsistencies of mitigation and individual compensation for businesses and individuals along the route. Some politicians and HS2 Ltd. have argued that the cost issue can be solved by reducing speed, the number of trains running, number of passengers, number of tunnels, type of materials used and so on, thus negating the original arguments in favour of the railway by seriously weakening the original business case.

Locally, there has been little further clarification about timing and impact. Early in January, the Parish Council and the History Society were somewhat surprised to be invited to give interviews to a consultancy, 'The Decorators', hired by HS2 Ltd. to consider the history of the areas through which the route passes, and also the impact on the area of 'the 1981 tornado' (Does any News reader remember that?). Anthony Bianco and Sheila Woolf attended these interviews. Apparently the idea is that travellers on the train will be able to listen to podcasts about the area through which they are passing. So much for the priorities of HS2 Ltd.!

The Parish Council has drafted a list of ten points for action with/by HS2 Ltd and the works contractors during 2019; these are listed on the Parish Council website. See their report on page 18 of this edition of the News.

However we can still take some time, in this often difficult part of the year, to stop and give thanks for the tiny flickers of light in our everyday lives.

We can stop and notice the earliest signs of Spring in the snowdrops, in the first buds on the otherwise bare trees or those first brave migrant birds who begin to show up in preparation for their breeding season.

In our personal lives, no matter how difficult or challenging they can often be, we can stop and notice those people and events that make it a little easier. Not least the fact we do now have electric lights, running water and central in most of our homes.

So as we wait for Winter to end and Spring to spring let us all take some time to be thankful for the small things that remind us that the Winter season of both creation and our lives does always come to an end and the warm sun and lighter days do eventually arrive.

If you can join us to celebrate the festival of Candlemas it will be at Ashow Church 9:30am on Sunday February 3rd.

#### Harry - a Proud Equestrian

Our October 2018 issue included an item, contributed by Liz Sykes, which highlighted that young Harry Horton-Barr, then aged 12 years, with his team of North Warwickshire Pony Club, had qualified for the 2018 Horse of the Year Show to be held in October at the NEC Birmingham. Harry's grand-parents live in Stoneleigh and Harry keeps his pony in the fields off the Birmingham Road. Liz's article drew attention to the team's efforts to raise the necessary funds towards the expenses of participating in the week-long event.

A reader suggested to Harry and his family, that he might like to write about his experiences at the show. The following is his report:

After qualifying for the HOYS (Horse of the Year Show) at the end of August it was a whirlwind of fundraising and training up until the big week.

Myself, Bo Crump, Alex Mallalieu, Isla Holman-West, Kate Tuttiett & Sam Pipkin made up the North Warwickshire team and as we had to do additional training with our ponies Pappy, Gunner, Splash, Casper, Nikki & Denny, we hired an indoor arena at Moreton Morrell College. We could play loud music and get people cheering in the stands to get the ponies used to the atmosphere we would be facing when we arrived at the NEC. We also had new races to learn as a team; the races are all relay and even include a couple of fancy dress races too, which make it exciting for the crowds!

The last time the North Warwickshire pony club team qualified for HOYS was back in 2001 so the branch were extremely excited to be heading back after such a long time.

We arrived at the NEC on the Monday because we had to get the camp and stables all set up as there is an award throughout the week for stable tidiness and our team turnout. It is marked on one day by the Household Calvary, which we won, and overall we were 2nd in the stable cup where the points are added up for the duration of the show.

The ponies have to be vetted on site to check they are fit to compete and all the riders weighed to make sure we are not too big for our ponies.

Six teams across the country qualify for the show, this year we competed against teams from Oakley Hunt West, West Hants, Romney Marsh, Atherstone Hunt and the Morpeth Hunt.

The competition at HOYS has two separate competitions - the first one is the Pony Club Cup which we competed for over the Wednesday and Thursday sessions. It was a tight competition with Oakley and West Hants finishing equal first and we were just behind for a respectable 3rd place! We did manage a session win though, which was great to be presented with, in the spotlight.

We then started to compete for the Prince Philip Cup; all teams taking part in four sessions of races and then the top four highest scoring teams head into the final (double points) on the Sunday night. This was a really tight competition and it went down to the very last race in the final session to decide which teams were in the final! Luckily we won that final session and we made the final.

Through to the final were West Hants, Atherstone Hunt, Oakley Hunt West and ourselves! It was a fast and furious final with double points on offer; it was all to play for. After battling it out over another seven races, the overall winners were the West Hants- they had been really consistent all week, followed in 2nd by the Atherstone Hunt and then in equal 3rd, us and Oakley Hunt West! The crowds were screaming with excitement, cheering us on. We have never experienced anything like it. It is definitely something we will all never forget and our amazing ponies behaved impeccably all week.

We are so grateful for all the support and donations we received; all of which went towards our amazing matching kit, team colours and matching rugs for our ponies and made us look super smart all week.

As a team we all agreed it was the best week of our lives and we have



made friends for life within our team and with the members of other teams.

Well done Harry! Harry is now 13 years of age and may compete in Pony Club events, in future years, until the age of fifteen.

#### **Stoneleigh Male Voice Choir News**

The Choir have been going through its busy season with concerts galore! Following on from the highly appreciated Armistice Commemoration, there were Carol Concerts in the Family Chapel at Stoneleigh Abbey 5th & 6th of December, put on by the Abbey itself. In the wonderful atmospheric setting a selection of Christmas songs, carols and readings was enjoyed by a capacity audience on both nights. The Choir opened with a rendition in Latin of "O Come All Ye Faithful" (Adeste fideles) with the audiences joining in after the first verse. The Choir sang a full and varied programme of seasonal music interspersed with the combined, massed voices of the audience and Choir for popular carols. The soloist Anna Bird rendered two lovely songs.

The audience excelled itself during a version of "The Twelve Days of Christmas". They were divided into sections, each section singing a "day" from the song in a "stand up, sit down" interlude! It was not only "Lords" that were "a leaping" on both nights and there was fierce competition going on to get in "on cue"!

Choir Chairman, Phil Jones gave the traditional readings and the end Blessing in the absence, through illness, of the Stoneleigh Vicar, Reverend Doctor Nikki Moon, and Kate McCutcheon told a selection of Christmas related tales both amusing and touching. Her last piece was a story of the frontline troops during the First World War having an unofficial cease fire on Christmas Day and playing the German soldiers at football instead of trying to kill each other. It was not reported whether the Germans won on penalties! Sadly hostilities resumed the next day with sides exchanging horrendous artillery bombardments.

Immediately following Kate's moving and splendid reading the Choir sang "Silent Night" in German as the lights were dimmed producing a most collection for LWS Night Shelter in Leamington, thanks to the generosity of our audiences, raised £650 which the Choir rounded up to £750.

#### **Meetings**

The February Ordinary Council meeting will be held at Ashow Village Club on Thursday 14th February at 7pm. Members of the public are invited to attend all Parish Council meetings.

The Parish Council precept for the next final year, April 2019 - March 2020 has been agreed at £16,980. This is a small increase on last year's figure. Full details of the accounts can be found in the December 2018 meeting minutes on the PC website.

The PC is very keen to progress with the Neighbourhood Plan for Stoneleigh & Ashow. A meeting to consider the next steps with the plan will be held in early February. At the last Parish Council meeting, held on January 10th, Ragu Sittambalam, Site Delivery Officer, and David Butler, Policy Manager, from Warwick District Council came along to introduce themselves and explain their role in taking forward developments in the local area. One of the key developments affecting the residents of Stoneleigh and Ashow is Kings Hill, which proposes to build 2,500 dwellings, as well as a community centre, primary school, secondary school and park. There are many issues with the proposed development that the Parish Council have raised with Warwick District Council, chief among these being the increased traffic that this will mean for the area. It has been agreed that there will be regular meetings between local councillors and representatives from WDC to examine how developments are being managed and provide updates on planning applications. The information from these meetings will be shared at Parish Council meetings.

Also during the January meeting, the Parish Council agreed a focus list of several points for action with HS2 and the works contractors during the coming months. The list can be found on the Parish Council website, in the minutes of the January meeting. If anyone wishes to add any issues to the list, please contact the Parish Clerk or Cllr Bianco.

At the meeting in December, the PC was joined by Fiona Anderson, of Warwickshire Community and Voluntary Action, who talked about a pilot project which is aiming to reduce social isolation within the rural areas of Warwick District. The Rural Life project is aiming to find out about issues which people living in rural communities may have which leave them feeling isolated. This could include lack of groups or activities, or the ability to travel into towns to use services. The project can help with setting up clubs, making connections with other services, or looking at ways of finding funding. More information about this project can be found on the Warwickshire CAVA website: www.wcava.org.uk.

The PC meeting in November welcomed representatives from HS2 to provide an update on the rail development. Lots of issues were discussed during the meeting, and details can be found in the meeting minutes on the PC website, along with a copy of the presentation given by HS2.

Also at the November meeting, Councillors were very keen to express their enjoyment of the event held to commemorate the anniversary of the end of WW1. The Parish Council acknowledged the efforts made by everyone involved, and with particular note to Ms Woolf, and would like to thank everyone for such a wonderful event.
