

As we have had a number of new families move to our village, we thought we would take this opportunity to let you know a little more about the Stoneleigh Village Club, which was established in 1856.

The club is run by volunteers, who are elected each year by members. We also organise a number of popular events such as the Duck Race, Halloween and Christmas parties. We encourage and need the support of village residents to support these events.

In 2013, members purchased the club building and garden. Funds from memberships go towards further improvements and ongoing maintenance. Membership for 2019/2020 is a flat rate of £12 per year per person, with under-18s free.

Events are published monthly in the Stoneleigh & Ashow News, on the noticeboard outside the club, via registered emails and on our Facebook page. We also have darts and pool teams, knit and knatter on a fortnightly basis, and a book club that takes place monthly.

We open Monday to Thursday at 7.00pm. On Friday, we open 'early doors' at 5.00pm – a very popular time to meet friends for a drink after work. At weekends, we open at 12.00pm. The club can also be hired for special events; please ask our friendly bar steward Jimmy for more details.

With more than 25 pubs and clubs closing every week, just £1 a month from our members ensures that we can keep this vital public facility open.

Another President at the Palace!

ost of us in Stoneleigh know Liz Sykes for the many roles she has undertaken in the village: president of the WI for many years, provider of the monthly village lunch, secretary of the village hall committee, membership secretary of the village club... These are just some of the ways in which Liz has benefited her own community at various times over the years.

Her "other life", however, might be less well-known, and 2019 sees that other life reach its pinnacle: this year she is president of Swim England. At the same time, she is still chairperson of City of Coventry Swimming Club and has been for four years. Up until last year, she has been swimming secretary for the West Midlands – ever since the region was set up – so has organised all the championships. Her involvement in swimming thus runs through from club swimming



through district and regional swimming (she is still on the board of West Midlands) all the way up to national and international.

Liz acknowledges that, if it hadn't been for her late husband, Graham, she would probably not have become involved in swimming. He, of course, went to the 1956 Olympics in Melbourne and was team captain for the 1960 Rome Olympics. He also won gold in the 100m backstroke at the 1962 Empire Games in Perth. Graham's influence on swimming in this country also extended to his development of Sportsystems in the 1980s, which completely changed the entry and result system for the sport, and brought computerisation. His system instigated a massive change from the early days of result production when they all had to be typed.

Naturally, Liz became involved in the world of swimming through Graham, and her involvement increased when her children, Gareth and Kate, took to the water. Gareth started training at about 12, when he won the ESSA championships; he later went to the world championships and made a European final in the individual medley. One of Liz's proudest moments is when she was doing the announcements at national championships at Coventry baths. Gareth had won and Graham was doing the presentations. She had to stop herself from saying "... and that's my husband and that's my son!"

Kate took after her father as the backstroker, swimming internationally for Wales. (Oh, did I mention that Liz is Welsh? There's a surprise for you!... and the irony of presiding over Swim **England** is not lost on her...)

Gareth now lives in Australia and his son Buster is a good breaststroke swimmer who has competed for his country. In fact, every member of Liz's immediate family has been involved in swimming. Meanwhile, in between her teaching, Liz was, throughout the 1990s, chairman of the national events committee and ran the organisation of all the big events. Now, since October 2018, she has become Swim England president, only the eighth ever woman to hold that position — and the first Welsh woman.



Liz currently spends many weekends travelling all the over country attending different swimming competitions in her official capacity. May, she was invited to Buckingham Palace for a garden party. Her daughter Kate came over from Ethiopia, where she now lives, to accompany her.

As if this were not exciting enough, a letter arrived a few days before the trip, from an equerry of the Duke of Cambridge – Liz was to be one of only 20 of the thousand-or-so people there to be personally presented to Prince William!

Thankfully, the weather that day was warm and sunny, and Liz and Kate took their place in line inside the palace to be introduced to Prince William, who is Patron of Swim England. He — and the Duchess of Cambridge — chatted for some time about the importance of young people learning to swim, a cause dear to Liz's heart.

Liz says she has thoroughly enjoyed all her life in swimming. "A lot of people asked me when Graham died if I would give it all up but, even then, I don't think they realised how much more involved I had become than Graham." She has certainly given the sport a huge amount of time and energy, first at local level and now at national. Congratulations, Liz!

an worrying add a single hour to your life?

It's the middle of June as I write, though the weather is more akin to late winter than early summer. After last year's heatwave, this rain and cold is a bit of a shock to the system, so let us hope that summer remembers to make an appearance soon.

Of course, the weather around us and, in fact, the external events that surround us can, if we allow them, seriously affect our wellbeing, mental health and attitude to life. It has been interesting to take notice of my own mood over the past few days of cold and very wet weather, and I am taking some time to reflect on just how much external events beyond our control can affect our joy and how we then treat others as a result.

As a Christian, I know that I am called to put aside the things I cannot control and the problems or issues of tomorrow, and instead focus on the here and now and put my energy and time into those aspects of life that can be influenced in a positive way.

Jesus teaches:

"Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?"

Matthew 6:25-27

He then goes on to state that those who seek the Kingdom of God will find all they need for life. It sounds simple, does it not? However, I certainly find it a difficult instruction to follow. Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update

he Orchard Group are currently in negotiations with the Pershore bottling plant, with the intention of offering a carbonated and bottled product. Efforts to achieve this are, however, being thwarted by what I am told is a national shortage of bottles. Despite this, the group remain optimistic that we will be able to have a bottled, carbonated product ready for the duck race in August or, failing that, later that month. The group have also been working with villager and fellow group member, Jules Storer, to create a label for our bottles which, at this point in time, involves a refinement and miniaturisation of the label developed for our boxes involving a "green man" tree caricature located at the end of Church Lane. Other recent activities have largely centred on selling "bag in the box" still cider in order to raise the capital to achieve our bottled cider ambitions. In fact, this year our bag in the box product has proved particularly popular, with some very positive feedback! Needless to say, we are hoping to generate a lot more five-litre cider boxes throughout the summer months.

In the orchard, this year's spring blossoms were a little sparse compared with last year's, and weather conditions have been such that those blossoms that did occur came and went very rapidly. As a consequence, there will definitely not be a reoccurrence of the bumper harvest of 2018. Certain cider apple varieties also tend to be biennial, i.e. the trees crop every other year, meaning that they have a chance to rest and develop foliage during the fruitless year. One other observation made in the spring was that leaves of many of the trees appeared to have been attacked by insect pests. We're still trying to identify the culprits, which may be many and varied, but definitely include aphids. The group ethos is not towards the use of pesticides. If a major issue did happen, then we would look towards the use of green alternatives as a means of control. Interestingly, a large number of ladybirds appear to predating on the aphids, which clearly demonstrates how nature creates its own "yin & yang" balance.

One "tongue-in-cheek" conclusion concerning this issue is that our first attempts to ward off evil spirits during our January Wassail were unsuccessful, so it will clearly need refining next year!

At the meeting in June, we were joined by a number of representatives from HS2 and works contractors to give an update on what is going on in the local area. HS2 Update: July 2019

nother month comes and goes. Speculation over the future of HS2 is only that, as once again the attention of the political classes is now on the Conservative leadership campaign and how to deal with the Brexit confusion. For those in the leadership campaign, loose talk on HS2 when not in any position of power is perhaps being tempered by the reality of power, and outright opposition now melts into cautious scepticism.

The enabling works continue. We have had a large swathe of trees cut from the south-eastern edge of the A46, but again we are not aware of a decision being taken on giving the main construction contractors the green light to proceed. In our section, that will be a consortium of Balfour Beattie and Vinci (BBV). They will be building the section of HS2 from Long Itchington, through Birmingham to Handsacre in Staffordshire.

The enabling works have been based on the Additional Provisions AP4, which is an addendum to the Hybrid Bill relating to HS2. There is some confusion at this stage as other works (e.g. the roundabout to the A46 at the Stoneleigh junction) may produce alternative outcomes, but it was not a part of AP4. However, for now, the works are based on AP4 as there are no other agreed proposals which might need to be taken back to Parliament – just speculation over possibilities.

BBV has carried out ground investigation works to try to define a tighter budget forecast for the project. Clearly, there has been some Treasury scrutiny over the projected costs of HS2. Is the political will moving further against this project? However, this is mere speculation and, until otherwise announced, this project remains on the books and we have to expect it to proceed.

HS2 made a representation to the Stoneleigh and Ashow Parish Council on 13th June, which proved to be a very contentious meeting as HS2 continue to make assumptions without reference to the local representatives and without considering other wider impacts, especially traffic, despite constant representation.

HS2 is proposing more community drop-in sessions. There is one booked for Tuesday 2nd July at Stoneleigh Village Hall from 6.00pm to 8.00pm. If you cannot make that session, there is also one scheduled for Tuesday 16th July at Kenilworth Youth Centre from 6.00pm to 8.00pm. Should you have any questions about the project and what lies ahead, then why not drop in and ask somebody from HS2?

Further enabling works should be scheduled to prepare the "haul route" for construction lorries, using the B4115 from the Thickthorn roundabout, and building the ramp up from the construction compound back on to the southern flow carriageway of the A46, which is why a deeper belt of trees has been cleared. You may wish to know more about timescales to implement these and what impacts to traffic flow are expected and how any mitigation may help. I would recommend that you try to drop in if you have questions.

Remembering the Dial House Farm Murder

t's exactly 200 years since the gruesome murder at Dial House Farm, Ashow.

Sunday 29th August 1819 was a glorious day, so farmer Joseph Dormer, his children and house guests went for an evening stroll after supper, leaving Mary Dormer and 21 year old servant girl, Ann Heytrey, at the farmhouse. When they returned, they found Ann in a distressed state in the kitchen and, upstairs, Mary Dormer dying of multiple stab wounds. Ann confessed to the murder, her explanation being that she 'had a thought in her head that told her she must do it'. A more likely reason is that she was incensed at not being allowed to attend the Ashow Wake that was taking place that day. She was hanged in public on the 'New Drop' in Warwick on 12th August 1820. A year later, her brother Thomas was hanged on the same gallows for his part in the murder of a doctor in Alveston. Mary Dormer is buried alongside her husband, Joseph, in Ashow churchyard.
