## **HS2 UPDATE**

Margaret Wallis, on behalf of the Stoneleigh Action Group (against HS2)

The future of HS2 is now very much tied up with what happens to the Johnson Government. The situation changes daily, as just about every other aspects of our country's life! There is supposed to be a financial review of the project by the end of the year and it is widely anticipated that burgeoning costs will be noted, but it is anyone's guess what will happen next. During his campaign, Boris Johnson led many potential supporters to suppose that the future of HS2 was in doubt but things are far less clear now. Meanwhile, Chris Grayling has been replaced as Transport Minister by Grant Shapps.

Enabling works continues and irretrievable damage caused along the route. Belatedly, residents in this area received official notices from HS2 Ltd about forthcoming vegetation clearance near Stoneleigh Park and their effects on traffic on the B4115 and the A46. This work along the route was postponed from the spring following a widespread outcry about such work being done during the nesting season. (At the time of writing, this work has yet to begin). Joe Rukin has prepared a heartfelt video about the landtake required for HS2 and illustrates just what this means for the ancient woodlands in our wider area. There continues to be considerable coverage about HS2 in the media, most of it hostile. Despite HS2 Ltd claiming to keep people informed, to deal with property claims fairly and expeditiously, and generally to be 'good neighbours', complaints proliferate which is very disheartening.

#### \*\*STOP PRESS\*\*

As we go to print, the transport ministry has named Douglas Oakervee (a leading critic of HS2) as the chairman of an independent review. He said he will produce a final report by the autumn. Transport Secretary Grant Shapps said "Then we will be in a much better position to make the decision to go or no go by the end of the year."

# **Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update**

As the apple crop ripened through the summer months, the Orchard group set about work in the Church Lane cider production plant, with the intention of boxing up approaching 900 litres of cider from the bumper harvest of 2018. The process essentially involves pumping cider out of fermentation tanks into holding vessels before drawing off into 5 litre bags for pasteurisation as well as sweetening to allow for different palates. We also had the option of presenting cider in clear 5 litre demijohns which made up for the disappointment of not being able to offer carbonated cider from our bottling plant in Pershore who could only offer our requested 750ml bottles in November, which of course is too late for the prime summer selling season!

Those members of our community who attended the Stoneleigh "Duck Race" may have taken the opportunity to purchase our cider at a stall in the Meadow as well as read about the project to date. That is when the information board hadn't blown away with the gazebo on what turned out to be a very windy but enjoyable day! We are pleased to say that despite the weather conditions all the cider available that day sold out and the list of expressions of interest is encouraging for the future.

We will shortly be coming into the apple and pear picking season so if you feel like some exercise at the weekend and see members of the group toiling in the orchard do feel free to join in, as well as meet the membership!

#### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NOTICE**

#### SHEDS, ALLOTMENTS AND GARAGES



Stoneleigh is fortunate in being a low crime rate area, but there are some things you can do to help keep it this way.

At this time of year, places where you store tools, machinery and other valuable equipment offer easy pickings to thieves.

You can reduce the risk of having your property stolen by:

- Always putting tools and equipment away in a locked place
- Disabling lawn mowers and other machinery when not in use and chaining items together to a solid anchor point
- Using closed shackle padlocks and installing alarms and security lights.

If your property is stolen, you have more chance of getting it back if it is recovered by the Police if you write down some details (make, model, serial number and identifying marks) and have pictures of the items.

#### You can also:

- Security-mark items with a UV pen or a forensic marking solution
- Keep hedges and fences maintained and gates locked
- Secure hanging baskets to their brackets
- Keep ladders locked up and out of site if possible




# In Memory of Bob Burdett

Maurice Robert Burdett was born to Harold and Ivy Burdett on 5<sup>th</sup> April 1936 in the Manor Hospital, Nuneaton. His sister Sue gave him the name Bob.

Bob loved talking about his early life. He remembered his childhood growing up around Bermuda Village, Nuneaton. He was three years old when the Second World War started. His father joined the RAF. His grandfather was a steam engine driver and from there stemmed Bob's love of trains.



Bob's love of gardening started at school and continued throughout his life. He created the most beautiful garden at Abbey Farm and was never happier than when pootling around in the garden and mowing lawns - he had five lawnmowers! The garden hosted so many happy family gatherings, including two weddings.

Bob loved making and fixing things. Before moving to Ashow, Bob rebuilt a house in Loxley. His much-loved grandchildren called him Bob the Builder. Bob helped to build a family holiday home in France. In fact, he and Clare enjoyed many trips to France - from Avignon to the French Pyrenees and, more recently, Collioure for a big family gathering to celebrate special family birthdays.

When he was 14, Bob contracted TB, so missed a lot of schooling. However, this didn't dampen his ambition and, at the age of 17, he became an apprentice at Alfred Herbert's in Coventry. During his time there, he furthered his education at Coventry Technical College. After 11 years he moved to Edgar Vaughan, where he spent most of his working life.

Bob's interests were wide-ranging, from sailing (he was a measurer for the RYA) to tennis and squash. He made lifelong sailing friends. For many years, he refused to play golf, saying that it spoilt a good walk. However, retirement changed that and he grew to love the games of golf organised by a close friend.

Retirement also offered more opportunities in the way of hobbies. He turned his hand to woodturning and also learnt to play the organ. Music was an important part of Bob's life. It was through his choral singing that he met Clare. Bob was keenly involved in all aspects of music at Ashow Church. He repaired the kissing gate and modified the old altar that is still in church today. He acted as church treasurer for many years. In fact, Bob was always involved in village life, in particular the installation of the village sewage system and the flood relief scheme.

Bob's health had deteriorated over the past few years. He passed away peacefully in his sleep on 6<sup>th</sup> July 2019 in the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham, where he had been for the previous week. He was 83 years old and had lived in Ashow with Clare for over 30 years. His funeral took place at Ashow Church on Monday 15<sup>th</sup> July 2019; the church was full to bursting with family, friends and villagers. It was a beautiful, moving service and was a fitting tribute to Bob, who was clearly so very loved by so many people.

I would like to thank the people of Ashow, old neighbours too, for all you did to give Bob such a beautiful funeral.

Thanks to the Reverend Jim Perryman for helping the family to arrange the service and conducting the funeral and burial; to Audrey and members of the church in helping in so many ways (from preparing the church and arranging the wonderful flowers, to planning the music and assisting on the day); and to those who mowed the grass, cut the hedges and generally made our beautiful churchyard look its best.

Thank you also to those who enabled us to use our field for parking and for the contribution of an additional marquee and tables to accommodate the food. A big thank you too to Ashow Village Club for the welcome and the great hospitality, as well as the use of the marquee.

Thank you for all the flowers, letters and cards – they were beautiful.

And finally, I would especially like to thank you all for coming to Bob's funeral. We were overwhelmed by the numbers who attended; it meant so much to us all.


Huge congratulations are due to everyone who was involved in this thoroughly enjoyable and inspiring event. The thought, planning and delivery were truly impressive. Thank you all.

## **Creationtide and harvest**

I just reread the article I wrote this time last year where I urged us all to take some time to enjoy the beautiful autumn season, or Creationtide as it is called in the church year. I spoke then of taking the time to enjoy the transformation that autumn brings, from the transformation of trees into a plethora of colour, as fruits of all kinds ripen and are ready for picking. The farmers' fields also transform as produce is brought in and the ground turns into a barren landscape until it is time to start the growing season again.

This week in Stoneleigh church we have been turning our attention to the autumn by planning our harvest festival (see last page for dates). Do come along for our family friendly services and help us to celebrate this beautiful time of the year. Please also bring non-perishable produce which we will donate to those in need through the local food banks.

This focus on autumn and harvest once again turns our attention to those we depend on for our food: our farmers and others who look after the land. It strikes me that once again they have had a difficult year. Last year it was the extreme heat which affected so many, this year it is all extremes of weather and the unpredictability of it that has brought problems up and down the country. We hold in our prayers those rural communities that have struggled with floods and hope the harvest has not been affected too badly.

And as we continue to live in uncertain times, particularly with regards to Brexit and HS2, we might spare some time to pray for the farming communities affected most by these looming situations. It can seem like there is little we can do to help but a friendly smile, a helping hand and making a commitment to buy more local and British produce (look for the red tractor on your food items) can make a difference to those who commit their lives to ensuring we have food on our tables.

And please know that if you are affected by a difficult harvest, the uncertainty of our times, or any other issue I am here to lend a listening ear alongside the daily prayers offered for you all. God Bless.
