Parish Council Meetings

The **November Ordinary Council meeting** will be held at Stoneleigh Village Hall on Thursday **14th November** at 7.00pm. We will have a presentation from Warwickshire County Council about the Joint Strategic Needs Assessment, which will inform council policies and spending on services.

At the Parish Council meeting in October, we were happy to welcome Cllr George Illingworth, Chair of Warwick District Council and previously a District Councillor for our area. He spoke about the challenges associated with the large-scale developments planned in the local area, but also of the opportunities available across the District with the 2022 Commonwealth Games.

We also received an update from Gareth Smith of Severn Trent Water about the redevelopment of Avon House into a training academy. Planning permission for the conversion has been granted and building work should start in the new year, taking about 6-9 months. Severn Trent are aware of the potential impact on local traffic and will be drawing up a travel plan for people using the site to minimise the impact on local roads.

Cllr W Redford informed us that there will soon be a consultation from Warwickshire County Council into making Stareton Road one way, and this will be discussed by the Parish Council when it is released. The Parish Council will also consider suggesting a reduction in the speed limit on Stareton Road, from 50mph to 30mph, as part of the consultation response. We were also updated by Cllr P Redford that the Autofest event will no longer be held at Stoneleigh Park.

Don't forget to check out the **Parish Council website** which is regularly updated with local information such as road and traffic issues, HS2 updates, regular Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team surgeries, information drop in sessions and local consultations. Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update

With the harvest of 2019 now collected and the final pressing scheduled for Saturday 19th October, by the time this article enters circulation the juice should already be in containers fermenting. The process surrounding the preparation of the juice at the start of containment is very important to get right in order to prevent any chance of infection or spoilage occurring before the addition of cider yeast to the liquor.

Nowadays, sterilization can be achieved through the addition of sulphites in the form of Campden tablets. It is with some astonishment and amusement that one can glance back in history and find out how this process was traditionally undertaken using brimstone (sulphur). One interesting reference to the process can be found in the works of the renowned diarist John Evelyn's Pomona of 1664 who quoted fellow Royal Society member, John Beale as



follows:

"Lay brimstone on a rag, and by a wire let it down into the cider vessel, and there fire it: and when the vessel is full of smoak the liquor speedily pour'd in, ferments the better!"

Needless to say the process sounded guite hazardous and one that the group will not be reviving!

With all the apples in the orchard now collected, the group's thoughts and activities now turn towards maintaining the trees and the land with a focus on pruning following damage to the exhaust pipe of the tractor during the final grass cut of the year, caused as a result of contact with low hanging apple tree branches! Finally, for those interested in purchasing cider we are still selling 5 litre boxes at £20 in both dry & medium dry with a 20% discount for "Friends of the Orchard". 
A Perfect Christmas Present

The event attracted the society's largest ever attendance, including former pupils and their relatives, relatives of former teachers, representatives of other history societies, some of Sheila's former colleagues and pupils, the Revd Neville Beamer (Stoneleigh vicar when the school closed), and others, in addition to society members. Sheila provided many facts and insights into the chequered history of the school and the role of the Leigh family in it, together with numerous anecdotes from former pupils. The talk was illustrated by some fascinating documents, quotes from the school log books, and nostalgic photographs. We are so fortunate to have such a dedicated and enthusiastic researcher and excellent presenter as the society's Chairman'!

The talk was followed by refreshments (thanks to Stoneleigh Abbey for the wine) and an opportunity to share memories of the school. A truly memorable evening.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 29 October in the Village Hall as usual. The Coventry Women's Research Group will tell us about some of the women who played a significant part in its history, including after the end of the Second World War. On 26 November there will be talk on Warwick County Asylum. Visitors are welcome (£3).

HS2 UPDATE

At the time of writing general political chaos continues. Amidst this, the Oakervee Review of HS2 is ongoing and although it is supposed to present its report 'in the autumn' now expected to be December once things are clearer (?) over Brexit. Rumours of its likely contents are rife, from complete cancellation to reduced speed, changed/abandoned routes etc. The only thing that is certain is that the project has been delayed; for how long, or if it continues at all, remains to be seen.

Readers of the News will be all too well aware of HS2-related works in this area. Maybe some of you may have noticed increased noise from the A46 now that a bank of protective trees have been removed. Protest camps at Cubbington Wood and more recently at Crackley Wood have attracted considerable national as well as local media coverage.. The temporary 'stay of execution' for ancient woodlands, announced by Grant Shapps in September, will only last until the Oakervee report is published and, regrettably, does not extend to other preparatory work, including the removal of vegetation and woodland along the route. Requests to halt this work have been ignored. Protests about this - possibly unnecessary - work will continue. Locally, there are two pieces of ancient woodland – on the B4115 and Echells Wood in Stoneleigh Park which includes some very old oak trees.

Work on the B4115, now in connection with the planned 'compound' continues and the traffic lights on that road remain a nuisance for local residents.

Arguments rage over the estimated and likely cost of HS2. Current figures quoted are £80-90 billion but evidence to the Review Committee state a cost of c£106.5 billion at 2015 prices! This figure does not include the cost of the rolling stock which is £708 billion. The Arnitt national economic review suggests £40 billion is required to support the planned stations and infrastructure. Such costs are mind-boggling!
