PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

<u>Meetings</u>

Because of the current social distancing requirements, Parish Council meetings are being held online, via Zoom. Residents are still welcome to attend (you do not need to have a zoom account to attend), just email the Clerk at

stoneleighashowparishcouncil@gmail.com to request a link before midday on the day of the meeting. Please also note that all information relating to meetings will be on the website only for now, no information will be posted on the village noticeboards.

The September meeting was joined by the Chair of Warwick District Council, Cllr Martyn Ashford who gave a brief introduction and explained that, as he has previously been a Parish Councillor, he understands the issues that parishes face and will try to assist parishes and residents if he can.

At the meeting the results of the consultation on Birmingham Road were announced. Of a total of 680 consultation papers sent out, 421 were returned. The votes were 275 in favour of closing the road and 146 in favour of keeping the road open. The consultation has shown that there is a substantial proportion of residents in favour of closing the road. The next step will be for the Parish

Council to formally write to Warwickshire County Council to request that their engineering staff look at the best option for how to close the road.


The outcome of the consultation will be communicated to all residents through the post, with further updates then available via the Parish Council website.

Dear Members

On behalf of the committee we would like to say a big thank you to you all for supporting the club during these difficult times. After all the hard work getting the club ready for the post lockdown opening, it has been wonderful to see the members returning and enjoying the facilities once again and following the necessary guidelines.

Following on from the government's latest instructions in respect to Coronavirus and the hospitality sector. We have reviewed the current Stoneleigh Village Club operating guidelines and want to inform you of necessary changes to ensure primarily your safety and also to comply with the new legislation. Please read the points below.

The club opening hours are changing to the following times which now includes weekday opening.

Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday	6.30 pm - 9.30 pm
Friday	4.00 pm - 9.30 pm
Saturday	2.00 pm - 9.30 pm
Sunday	12.00 pm - 6.30 pm

- 1. All members and guests must ensure they are wearing a face covering when entering the club premises. Note children under the age of 7 are exempt from wearing face coverings.
- 2. All members and guests must complete the mandatory track and trace documentation and use the hand sanitiser station on entering the club premises.
- 3. After completing the track and trace and hand sanitisation members and guests must proceed to an empty table of suitable size for their group, remembering no group shall be greater than six persons. Face coverings can be removed when sat down.

- 4. Drinks are required to be ordered via table service. Please exercise patience and wait for the club steward to come to your table and take your order.
- 5. Card payment is preferred and will require a single member of your party wearing a face covering going to the bar where the card machine is located. Cash can also be used.
- 6. Members and guests must wear a face covering when using the toilet facilities.

In a nutshell the simple rule with face coverings is if you're not sat at a table and are moving around the club premises you must wear a face covering.

We trust you understand the importance of complying with the above guidelines remembering we are open to scrutiny from the licensing authorities and the police who now have considerable powers to enforce the new legislation. Fines for non-compliance are considerable!

HS2 UPDATE

Residents cannot fail to have noticed HS2 Ltd activity in the village during the latter part of September. Having failed to appear at times and locations as notified during July, works took place from Stoneleigh Road to Birmingham Road at various points during September, with no notice to individual households (as had been promised) and in some cases at variance with the AA notices posted at either side of the village. This caused considerable confusion, inconvenience and annoyance. All the evidence is that these problem are likely to continue as the full programme of work gets underway now that the Government has given the full go-ahead. Meanwhile, increasing inconvenience is being caused to local traffic by works associated with the new A46 roundabout. Unfortunately, a long period of frustration faces us all and the desecration of local countryside continues unabated.

A York Ghost Story

Early January of this year marked the occasion of my sixtieth birthday. As a part of those celebrations, my fiancée Mandy had arranged a weekend stay in York, a city full of historic interest and curiosity. We were staying centrally and virtually adjacent to York Minster at the "Guy Fawkes Inn hotel" formerly "The York Inn". We had deliberately chosen this hotel following an internet search that displayed some very characterful and ambient rooms that seemed to invoke the character and history of the old city.

On arrival it was clear that the hotel possessed more than the historic character with which we are both so familiar within our own respective, warm Stoneleigh cottages. The frontage of the hotel looked Georgian in age, but this was perhaps a facade built upon a far older structure. Perhaps the owners of the hotel had geared themselves to appeal to a specific, quirky and spooky market which supplemented crooked beams, angled floors and a sloping staircase with dimmed lighting, blackened furniture and unusual artefacts. It was hard to dispute the adage that first impressions often last, and even more so when we were introduced to our room "The Belfry Suite". This room was located at the top of the hotel in what I assume to have once been an attic area. It was accessed via a tight, steep, spiral staircase behind a narrow door on the third floor landing. The suite had a quirky layout in which a narrow corridor and broad landing linked an expansive bedroom and bathroom to a lounge overlooking a courtyard in which once stood the house in which Guy Fawkes the infamous gunpowder plotter is understood to have grown up. The room though well kept and clean could best be described as unsettling which wasn't helped by the fact that one had to stoop to avoid colliding with the overhead beams and ceiling. In the corner of the bedroom a teddy bear was seated on a small rocking chair at the end of the metal framed bedstead in which we would sleep that evening.

We had booked the suite for a couple of nights and though initially unsettled by the layout we both gradually started to become accustomed to it and any feelings of unease began to fade. On peering out of the top window I was afforded spectacular views of the Minster though I couldn't help but notice a lone Scottish street singer staring fixed eyed up at my window as he chanted an eerie Jacobite lament. I consider both Mandy and I to be pretty strong personalities unlikely to be fazed by anything remotely considered to be supernatural! Mandy stressed from the start that she did not believe in such things and would be more afraid of rats that had afflicted properties in Church Lane, Stoneleigh, a year or so back during a particularly cold winter. We both resolved to challenge such fears by booking onto a couple of ghost tours which are a speciality of York. The first involved a comedic shaking bus which was more of a fun event than scary and visited amongst other places the grave of "John Palmer otherwise Dick Turpin", the well known 18th century highwayman and the second the "original" ghost tour which involved a narrator who vaguely resembled the actor Derek Jacobi in appearance, complete with fedora hat and long trailing overcoat. He recounted stories based on true accounts that varied from an Earl of Northumberland who is said to wander up the well known city street known as the "Shambles" in search of his head, to a column of Roman Legionaries observed trooping through the cellar of the "Treasurer's House" adjacent to the Minster and observed by a visiting plumber back in 1953. Both tours were entertaining and can be recommended.

The night, however, was cold and damp and both of us were pleased to return to the hotel for a small night cap in the bar prior to returning to our room. It had after all been a long day of travel and walking and we were both, naturally, very tired.

It was shortly before midnight by the time we had got our heads down. I recall listening to a breeze that had got up during the night and that played with cables that connected to aerials and a satellite dish on the roof. As all internal doors were shut and there was no detectable draft, I felt secure and settled before drifting into sleep. Some ten or fifteen minutes later, I was awoken sharply by the sound of two or three small bumps followed by a loud crash. I was comfortable and didn't feel any compulsion to undertake an investigation. A little later Mandy who was

unable to sleep got out of bed and entered the bathroom. To her astonishment her large and colourful Italian toiletry bag appeared to have been thrown across the room, emptying and strewing its entire contents across the bathroom floor at some distance from the window sill on which it had previously stood. Our feelings were ones of puzzlement as the window was perfectly sealed and my own toiletry bag was unmoved. I was too tired to reason so once again started to drift back into a light slumber. Mandy on the other hand slept badly that evening and at one point awoke from a nightmare then howled as she shot across the bed towards me. She insisted that she had been touched on the face. I dismissed this as part of the dream and once again drifted back to sleep; thankfully the rest of the evening was uneventful.

The following day we had a full itinerary of events planned so we were up early, with memories of the previous evening's disturbance easily subdued if not forgotten. On completing breakfast Mandy returned to the suite whilst I chose to read some of the historic literature about the gunpowder plot and It was whilst reading this that I couldn't help but overhear a young couple who were checking out in conversation with a couple of room staff. They were discussing the possibility of the hotel being haunted. I can only assume that they had noticed me listening in as from that point the conversation gravitated towards me and I recounted the previous evening's events. One of the staff inquired as to which room I was staying in? "The Belfry Suite" I replied. As if pasted in from some 1960's Hammer movie the hotel staff fell silent. It was as if someone had switched on a light to reveal a hidden narrative. I was told that the room had an unpleasant history involving a young boy who had hung himself from the banisters of the staircase within the suite and that paranormal investigators had undertaken an extensive investigation only a few months previously. I was at this stage a little concerned and regretted not having chosen a Holiday Inn for our stay. Another side of my personality reasoned that there are no such things as ghosts after all. I was also aware that we had another evening to complete in the "Belfry Suite". I definitely wasn't going to quit the hotel like a coward so rightly or wrongly chose to keep the story from Mandy. There was a nagging sense of fear and anticipation about what the coming evening

would bring, however, and I also felt a little guilty about keeping of the story of the room a secret from my fiancée.

We dined out with some of Mandy's friends from Harrogate that evening a short distance from the hotel and then returned early, both opting not to drink in order to get an early night.

Mandy was tired having had poor sleep the previous evening and so she slept virtually in a coma, whilst I found sleep at a premium and difficult to come by, with the events of the previous evening starting to come back sharply into focus. In truth I had pulled the bed covers over my head and it took a while for me to drift off. It must have been around three or half past three in the morning when my sleep was disturbed by the sense that the iron framed bed was periodically being shaken. The bed continued to shake on and off for nearly half an hour as I continued to pretend to be asleep. Though not blessed with children myself I guess the sensation could be compared to the antics of a small child trying to attract the attention of a parent. At one point, feelings of unease were replaced by ones of annoyance. I was tired and whatever it was, endeavoured to keep me awake. Needless to say, Mandy slept still and sound throughout. Eventually my tactic of ignoring the disturbance paid off and I thankfully fell asleep.

On checking out the following day we took the opportunity to discuss our encounters in the Belfry Suite with hotel staff. We were told that it is not unusual for folks to check out or flee the room in the early hours of the morning. Indeed, there was an occasion when one customer fled the room with a face wound, having had his coat hurled at him! The stories of the Belfry Suite broadened to include an old lady situated in the rocking chair as well as an amusing discussion on whether the teddy bear's head changed position by itself. An entire folk law seemed to spring from the room, some of which seemed to stretch credibility. I could only base my theories on what I had encountered and witnessed. I guess that there may have been the opportunity to challenge the hotel for a refund, as we had only wished to tour historic York, not meet the locals. Later research uncovered that the Belfry Suite may be haunted by the spirits of two small children who died of cholera. It was by coincidence that the nation would shortly succumb once again to a pandemic with some of the early Covid 19 hotspots being centred in York.

Some theories to date include an elaborate wireless hoax to account for the shaking bed, but I found no evidence in support of this. Despite showing some courage in refusing to flee and instead choosing to ignore any potential spirits, I was so unsettled that I chose to sleep under the sheets for some weeks afterwards. Finally, and regardless of what's haunting people, there does seem to be a consensus that this characterful little inn is undeniably creepy.
