#### **Stoneleigh Community Orchard Update**

With the arrival of Spring, attention has once again turned to the awakening orchard along with the prospects for the coming year.

Central to this is the "Stoneleigh Orchard Blossom Festival" and our team, led by Quentin Compton-Bishop and Amanda Freeman, are already working hard to make this a success.

The event, scheduled for Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> May 2:30 to 4:30pm, will occur in the orchard field at the end of Church Lane. It is planned that our sparkling cider will be newly available for sale on the day.



Here, amongst an assortment of stalls, crafts and entertainments all described in our accompanying poster, will be placed a "Wicker Man" art installation which myself and fellow villager Rory O'Connor are currently in the process of creating. It is intended that the Wicker Man becomes a feature in the village throughout early summer and leading up to Midsummer's Day.

For those readers who are unfamiliar with the origins and symbolic significance of the Wicker Man then I have undertaken some brief research which may serve as an introduction.

In truth its origins are a little obscure, but it is assumed to be central to ancient Celtic and Druidic tradition. In it a wicker cage structure is created then filled with straw and sacrifices before being burned usually on Midsummer's Day, otherwise known as Litha in Pagan tradition. Perhaps some of the earliest accounts are Greco-Roman in origin and date from the 1st Century BCE most notably being described in Roman General Julius Caesar's commentary on the Gallic War in which he writes that a large wickerwork figure with limbs was filled with living men and set on fire!

The Greek geographer Strabo adds that the ashes were believed to help crops grow. There is a broad consensus that such descriptions may represent early Roman propaganda designed to present their Celtic enemies as "barbarians" thereby demonstrating the ancient equivalent of modern day "Fake News".

More recently "The Wicker Man" was a 1970's film classic set on a neopagan Scottish Isle and starring Edward Woodward, Britt Ekland and Christopher Lee. Needless to say, there will be no human sacrifices taking place in Stoneleigh Community Orchard! Instead, the Wicker Man will serve multiple roles in advertising and signage.

Our Wicker Man will of course require a name, so we welcome suggestions!

#### **HS2 Update**

As we await further developments regarding the A46 bridge slide, and hope that it might be possible to watch this closer up, we have had a taste of what the traffic flow might be like during the three week planned closure of the A46.



BBV admit there were teething problems during the first weekend closure and sought to amend some of

the issues for the second. However, a three week closure with weekday commuting traffic may well test the resilience of our road network. The dates for the closure have now been confirmed as from April 11<sup>th</sup> to May 1<sup>st</sup>, potentially being effected the evenings before, so keep an eye out for signs. Crew Lane will also be closed shortly. Signs are on that section of road. Locally, during the dry spell we have just had, dust has settled across the village, more so to the north.

On a wider picture the Public Accounts Committee which has never given this project any grade above amber/red to my knowledge, now appears to be sounding alarm bells, citing reputational damage to the UK over the Government's failure to get to grips with the project. Scant consolation to us here. The tunnel boring machines I advised you about a few editions ago are now on hold and will not be heading for Euston. Frankly it's a huge mess and starting the project without a clear plan for Euston is irresponsible. However it goes on, and sadly do I!

Plans are being mooted to use even longer trains than originally designed for, such trains above 200m long cannot be run north of Birmingham once it uses "classic" track due to platform length restrictions.

Hopefully later in the year the local overbridges will open which should allow excavation of the whole line and bring the civil engineering part of the project closer to completion, this being potentially the most disruptive, but we shall see.

#### A Gesture of Love

April means Easter this year. And I've been thinking that Easter is not so much about figuring out what exactly happened on Good Friday, or whether Jesus rode a colt, a pony, or a donkey on Palm Sunday. I've come to believe that the events of that first Easter are less about understanding and more about experiencing — experiencing the love of God shown to us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

One of the most powerful gestures of love I've ever experienced came from my little sister, Lorena. It was during the Easter holidays in 2006 when I went home from university to visit my family and spend time with her. She was very ill. Lorena had always been the healthiest, happiest, and most joyful kid — always smiling, always laughing. But suddenly, she became unwell, and within a few weeks, she was diagnosed with a brain tumour. She was only 14.

She underwent surgery, and the doctors tried their best to remove the tumour. But sadly, her condition continued to worsen. So when I visited that Easter, my sister was receiving palliative care at home. She was paralysed, unable to speak, and could only use one arm — with great effort — to communicate.

Easter always reminds me of her. I will never forget one particular day during that visit. We were lying in bed next to each other, watching our favourite cartoon — Ed, Edd n Eddy (a rather strange American show we both enjoyed). And then, suddenly, she raised her frail right arm — the only one she could move — and looked at me intently.

I turned to her and watched as she began to trace letters in the air, slowly, deliberately. I followed them carefully: T.E. I.U.B.E.S.C. — Romanian for I LOVE YOU. Then she smiled at me and placed her hand over her heart to show how much she meant it. Lorena died later that year, but her simple, wordless gesture of love still fills my heart to this day.

Easter is full of gestures of love. Jesus entering Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, riding humbly on a donkey — a gesture of love. Jesus washing His disciples' feet at the Last Supper — a gesture of love. And above all, Jesus letting His hands be nailed to the cross on Good Friday — a gesture of love like no other.

But He didn't stay dead. His rising from the grave on Easter Sunday is God's greatest gesture of love — a love that reaches beyond death, and gives us hope that never dies. So this Easter, may we remember that love is stronger than death, and that God's love, in Jesus, is for each and every one of us. Happy Easter!


